

Minnesota Winner of NCAA Meet

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Minneapolis, Minn., June 19—University of Minnesota was a rude host to the Southern California Trojans here today and sneaked off with the national collegiate track team title with 46 points.

Twenty-one of the Gophers' points came in such "freak" Olympic events as the hammer throw, steeplechase, 10,000 meters and hop, step and jump.

The disappointing Trojans, for whom only Pell-Mel Patton lived up to full expectations, scored 41½ points for second. Texas placed third with 40 points.

Patton Brilliant

If the Trojans lost out in the team standings, however, Patton gained even greater prestige as the world's fastest human. He won both the 100 and 200 meters—he became the first Trojan ever to win the longer dash in the NCAA—in respective times of 10.4 and 20.7 seconds.

The latter time bested all American records for the distance-around-a-curve and equaled Jesse Owens' Olympic time at Berlin. Patton was aided by a 6.6 m.p.h. wind down the final 120 yards, however.

The failure of the Trojan vaulters to do better than 13ft. 8in. lost the meet for SC. Neither Bob Hart nor John Montgomery could do 13ft. 10in., while the Gophers' Don Cooper grabbed third at 13ft. 10in. George Rasmussen of Oregon and Warren Bateman of Colorado tied for first at 14 feet.

Other high scorers were: Illinois 34½, California 19½, Michigan and Ohio State 18, Stanford 17½, Rhode Island State 15½.

Patton was the only double winner of the day and his two firsts contributed close to half the Trojan point total.

Roland Sink placed third in the 1500 meters as did Bob Chambers in the 800 and Ron Frazier in the 400-meter hurdles.

The surprise victory in the hop-step-jump by Loyd La Moie at 45ft. 10in. actually won the meet for Jim Kelly's home towners. Those 10 big points came in after all other events had been run off and boosted Minnesota into the lead, much to the delight of 15,563 elated fans.

It was Minnesota's first team victory in the national collegiate meet since the meet was first held in 1921. Troy's record now stands at 12 wins, five seconds and two also-rans in 19 tries.

Donnie Anderson of California, the pride of Pasadena, was second to Patton in the 100 meters, two yards back. Patton took the metric furlong by three yards over Charles Parker of Texas and Paul Blenz of Tulane.

Bayless Unplaced

Bill Bayless of the Trojans failed to improve in the shot-put and dropped back to a non-scoring seventh when Jim Fuchs of Yale boomed from seventh to fifth on his final toss. Fortune Gordien scored good points for Minnesota when he moved into second on his last trial. The favored Charles Fonville of Michigan won as scheduled at 54ft. 7in.

Roland Sink of Troy ran in the ruck during the 1500-meter run for the first three laps and then pulled to the outside. He got into second place 150 yards from home but then lost to the closing sprint of Herb Barten of Michigan, who was runnerup to the winner, Wisconsin's Don Gehrman. The defending champ,

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Gerald Karver of Penn State, ran ninth. The time was 3m. 54.3s. Sink's third-place time was announced at 3m. 55.4s.

Norman (Scooter) Rucks of South Carolina, showed his heels to a fast 400-meter field in 47.2s. Mal Whitfield, the ex-Jefferson High star who now runs for Ohio State, lagged in fourth place.

Willie Steele of San Diego State came through, after trailing in yesterday's trials, with a winning broad jump of 24ft. 11¼in.

Dixon in Fast Race

Craig Dixon of the Bruins found the pace of Clyde Scott of Arkansas and Bill Porter of Northwestern too hot in the 110-meter high hurdles and placed third. Scott, who set a new NCAA record of 14s. flat yesterday, was timed in 13.7s. today.

The mark equaled the world record but it is doubtful it will ever reach the record books because of an aiding wind of 6.2 m.p.h. Dixon's approximate time was 14s. flat.

Franklin (Bud) Held improved his leading mark to 209ft. 8in. to win the javelin over California's Frank Friedenbach.

Leapers Short

Tom Follis of Troy and George Stanich of UCLA each cleared 6ft. 4in. in the high jump but didn't score. Dwight Eddleman of Illinois and Irv Mondschein of New York U cleared 6ft. 7in. to tie for first and four others—including California's Chuck Hanger—did 6ft. 6in.

Big Bob Chambers bulled his way into third place for Troy in the 800 meters behind Whitfield and Jack Dianetti of Michigan State. The defending champion, Bill Clifford of Ohio, was fifth. Bob Pruitt of SC trailed too far the first lap, never caught up and was eighth. The time was 1m. 51.1s.

Ronnie Frazier fought his way into third place in the 400-meter hurdles although handicapped by an outside lane. George Walker of Illinois won in 52.4s. for a new meet record. Frazier's time was given as 53.1s.
