Other Locals

Yesterday in the opening session Patton had made good in the 100. Roy Cochran of the Mercuries qualified in the 400-meter hurdles, as did George Spanich of UCLA in the high jump, and Dr. Steve Seymour of LAAC in the javelin.

There were upsets today—and plenty of them. Charles Fonville of Michigan did not make the team. The unofficial world-record holder in the shot-put placed only fourth, behind Jim Delaney of the Olympic Club, Thompson—who came through with the greatest toss of his career, 54ft. 11 1/2 in.—and Jim Fuchs of Yale.

Harrison Dillard, who fortunately for him had qualified for the team in the 100-meter dash yesterday, hit four hurdles and did not finish the 110-meter barrier race.

Elaw Out

Forrest Elaw, the veteran steeple-chaser from Stillwater, Okla., ran fourth in this event, in which he was an odds-on favorite.

Anyone who would have predicted a week ago that Fonville wouldn't make the boat and that Dillard wouldn't have qualified as a hurdler would have been stuck away in the booby-hatch. But that's just how things stand.

Patton was brilliant today. He ran in the pole lane and was in front all the way. Ewell gave him a real battle, with Bourland close behind. But Pell-Mel was right today. His start was perfect, unlike yesterday's dismal starts in the 100. He in truth looked like the world's fastest human.

Bob Chambers ran a gritty race to place third in the 800-meter run and become a surprise qualifier for the team. Mal Whitfield, the ex-Jefferson High star of a few years ago, won in 1m. 50.8s. Herb Barten of Michigan was second. Chambers just beat Tarver Perkins of the Ill.

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nois AC for the final qualifying spot.

Whitfield came back late in the day to also win the 400-meter dash in 46.6s. He looked great. In an exhibition race, opposing a handicapped opponent, Jamaican Herb McKenley ran the lap in 46.2s.

Roland Sink ran well in the 1500 meters to qualify for the team, although he was just a foot in front of Penn State's Jerry Karver at the wire. Clem Eischen of Washington State was the surprise runner-up to Don Gehrman, who won in 3m. 52.2s.

Craig Dixon ran the two greatest races of his life in the heat and final of the 110-meter hurdles to place second in each. Bill Porter won the final in 13.9s., about five feet in front of Craig, with Clyde Scott of Arkansas third.

Dixon was rated at no better than fifth in the prerace dope but he was right up there and even if Dillard hadn't broadsided the barriers Craig would have still made good.

McMillan Surprises

Bob McMillan proved himself to be Uncle Sam's "sleeper" at London. His winning time for the steeplechase was 9m. 18.7s., and nobody yet knows how fast he can really go the distance. The race was only Mac's second of this type in his career.

Moose Thompson's shot-put mark of 54ft. 11 1/2 in. was accomplished on his final attempt as he rested in last place. It temporarily put him in the lead but Jim Delaney of the Olympic Club came through on his last put with a winning mark of 53ft. 1 1/2 in. to take it all. Fonville did 54ft. 1 1/2 in. to trail Yale's Jim Fuchs.

Willie Steele proved himself to be the world's greatest broad-jumper when he came up with a 26ft. mark, only two inches behind his winning effort of 26ft. 2 in. of yesterday. Then he leaped 26ft. 10 in. to beat all world records—but he fouled by only one-quarter inch!

Beckus came up with a good third-place effort in the hop-step-jump at 48ft. 1 1/2 in. Bill Albans of Elizabeth, N.J., and Erik Koutonen of Fitchburg, Mass., tied for first at 48ft. 11 1/2 in.

Local Vaulters Fail

In the pole vault the Southland candidates all failed although John Montgomery of SC did the best of his life—14ft. 4 1/2 in.—to take fourth. He forced the top three to really show their stuff. Boo Morcom of New Hampshire and Guinn Smith, ex-California now of the Olympic Club, cleared 14ft. 8 1/2 in. Bob Richards of Illinois AC was third at 14ft. 6 1/2 in.

Earle Meadows, Bob Hart of SC and Bill Larson of Stanford did 13ft 6 1/2 in. to tie for sixth.

Gaylord Bryan of Stanford was an also-ran at fifth in the

hop-step-jump at 47ft. 3 1/2 in., and Leonard Evans of L.A. City College was seventh at 46ft. 8 1/2 in. Earl Engman of Santa Barbara College trailed at 45ft. 7 1/2 in.

Bill Bayliss of Troy came up with a put of 53ft. 2 1/2 in. but it wasn't good enough as the top four all bettered 54ft.
