Beaten in 100, Hurdles

MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 3. The Los Angeles Athletic Club today placed second in the senior national AAU track and field meet, marked by a number of stunning upsets or near upsets.

As the Mercuries, bolstered by Trojan and Bruin talent, scored 69 1/3 points behind New York Athletic Club's 84, the following amazers were noted by the crowd of 12,000.

Dillard Beaten

1—Harrison Dillard, undefeated in 82 consecutive races, bowed twice—he lost the 100 to the veteran Barney Ewell and then he was beaten by Bill Porter of Northwestern in the high hurdles.

2—Roland Sink, diminutive Trojan distance star, chased the great Gil Dodds right down to the wire before losing by only three yards in the 1500-meter run.

3—Johnny Fulton, ex-Stanford star, failed to place in the 800-meter run and won't be in the field for the final Olympic try-outs at Evanston next week.

4—The veteran Cliff Bourland ran the greatest furlong of his career to bow only to Lloyd LaBeach in the 200-meter dash.

5—LaBeach failed to make it a double because he was tossed out of the 100 by the starter for twice jumping the gun.

Sink ran the greatest race of his life to almost catch Dodds near the wire. Roland sprang from the pack behind Parson Gil with 440 yards to go and actually outpaced Dodds for the final lap.

Sink Threatens

Dodds ran his first three laps in 57s., 64s., and 66s., but with 440 to go Sink started moving. Unofficial time for Dodds' last quarter-mile was 65s., which means Sink must have rambled his final lap in about 61s.

Ewell scored a narrow victory over Dillard in the metric century. The time, 10.6s., was slow compared to the 10.4s. Dillard had run in a qualifying heat. LaBeach took his trial run in 10.5s.

Herb McKenley, who yesterday had set a new world record of 400 meters at 45.9s., successfully defended his title in 46.3s., plenty fast in itself.

McKenley again set a blistering pace and won as he pleased. Mal Whitfield, the ex-Jefferson High star who has been running for Ohio State, was second and Ollie Matson, the San Francisco prep wonder, held on for third.

Porter Takes Highs

Bill Porter of Northwestern handed Dillard his second defeat of the afternoon—a really tremendous upset—when he won the high hurdles in 14.1s. Craig Dixon of UCLA was narrowly nipped for third by the veteran Ed Dugger, former Tufts star. It was Dillard's first high-barrier defeat since the 1946 Central collegiates when he was edged by Illinois' George Walker. Dillard's last loss in any type of race prior to today was in the 1947 Coliseum Relays low hurdles when Porter beat him.

Jim Delaney of the Olympic Club defended his title in the shot-put with a winning effort of 53ft. 8 1/4 in. Wilbur Thompson of the LAAC and Troy's Bill Bayless, also representing the Mercuries, placed and qualified for next week's final Olympic tryouts at Evanston.

Bob McMillan, ex-Cathedral High star who was ineligible at Glendale College in midseason this year, came through with an unexpected second place in the 3000-meters steeplechase behind the Oklahoma old-timer, Forrest Elaw. It was only Mac's second race over the rugged water-jump

course whereas Eflaw has been running this race for a number of athletic generations.

The veteran Roy Cochran won the 400-meter hurdles by five full yards in 52.3a., over Ennis Gray of the New York AC. Calling on his long experience, Cochran let the others build up a fast early pace, but Roy shifted into high gear the last 200 yards, took Gray at the ninth hurdle and won, going away.

Dr. Steve Seymour, the nation's premier javelin thrower, easily won his specialty. He had four tosses beyond that of any other rival, and his winning throw was 230ft., 5in. Delf Pickarts, the San Bernardino Valley JC lad who teams in the event with Seymour for the Mercuries, was third.

LaBeach came back to win the 200-meter over the veteran Cliff Bourland and the even older Ewell, ex-Penn State flash. LaBeach, running in the outer lane, raced well into the front, Bourland, beating Ewell over this rout for the first time of their long rivalry, was always in second. LaBeach's margin was three yards, and his time was 21a. 8st.

Bradley Loses

Glendale Hoover High School's John Bradley lost a special race to Lt. Bill Carter of the Army for the qualifying spot in the final Olympic tryouts next week. Carter's time was 21.7s.

Johnny Fulton failed to qualify for the tryouts when he placed seventh in the 800-meter final.

Herb Barten of Michigan was the surprise winner in 1m. 51.3a. Fulton took the lead 200 meters from home but was all through in another 50. He attempted a rally in the final 30 yards but just failed to catch the sixth spot.

Meadows Qualifies

The veteran Earle Meadows, former Trojan ace and the 1936 Olympic pole vault champion, qualified for the tryouts when he went up over 14ft. to tie for fourth.

A. Richmond Marcom of New Hampshire and Bob Richards, ex-Illinois, tied for first at 14ft. 6in. Troy's John Montgomery, who had previously qualified at the NCAA meet, was in the tie with Meadows at 14ft.

The Bruins' George Stanich qualified for the tryouts in the high jump when he placed sixth at 6ft. 4 5/8in. Two veterans, Tom Scofield of Kansas, and Bill Vessie of Columbia U., tied for first at 6ft. 7 5/8in.

One Final Event

One final tryout event was held here, the 10,000 meters run. The first three were Edward O'Toole of the New York AC, Fred Wilt, the former Indianan who now lives in Pullman, Wash., and Herman Godberg of Philadelphia.

O'Toole's winning time of 32m. 29.7a. gets him a trip to London, but he won't get anywhere against the Europeans.

A new world record was set in the 56 pound weight by Henry Dreyer of the New York AC,

who won with a mark of 41ft. 2 3/4in. The former world mark, set way back in 1911 by Matt McGrath, was 40ft. 6 3/4in.

Competing in the hop-step-jump for the first time, Stanford's Gaylord Bryan won with a leap of 47ft. 11 1/4in.

In the discus throw the Bruins' Taylor Lewis, who had gone unplaced in the NCAA meet, finished in the money to qualify for Evanston. Fortune Gordien of Minnesota won as anticipated.
