

Bryan Brilliant, but SC Wins by 72 1-6 to 58 5-6

PALO ALTO, April 30—Knowing full well he had the best hand going in, Coach Jess Hill of SC played his cards boldly here this afternoon and they paid off to the tune of a 72 1/6 to 58 5/6 triumph over Stanford in a terrific Pacific Coast Conference dual meet.

A shirt-sleeved throng of 12,000, the largest ever to see a dual meet in the Stanford Stadium, thrilled to surprising performances in virtually every event as the tide of battle swayed back and forth.

Biggest shocker came in the two-mile run when Johnny Cherry of SC came through to win in 9m. 44.6s., a full 15 seconds faster than he had ever done.

Race Build-up

The build-up for this race was this: Both Hill and Stanford Mentor Jack Welershauser threw everything they had into the fray at the outset, the Trojans entering Bob Pruitt, who was expected to win the 880; Bobby Mitchell, top two-miler, and Will Baillie in the opening mile.

Stanford retaliated with Al Lyons, distance event bulwark, and Drew Terramorse, No. 1 half-miler.

The race was a classic, with Lyons nipping Pruitt in a rousing finish by a foot in 4m. 18s. and Baillie third, clocked in 4m. 23s.

But that killed Lyons off for his predicted two-mile triumph. True, it also was Pruitt's undoing for the day but Hill had Wally Wilson and Stan Mattoon to fill in the 880 breach.

Wide Margin

Wilson took the two lapper by 12 yards in 1m. 55.7s. And Mattoon came fast in the drive home to edge out the Tribe's George Mooers for the valuable place points.

Stanford's Jose Rael led all the way in the two-mile grind until 400 yards to go. Then Cherry cut loose with a long, powerful stride that quickly pulled him away and left Rael 35 yards back at the tape. Lyons trotted home third, 90 yards farther back.

Those were the two big strategic moves of the meet and Troy had all the best of it. Welershauser's mistake, and it amounted to a blunder, was in wasting Terramorse in the mile, knowing he couldn't hope to place.

Other Breaks

The other breaks were evenly divided but when SC took the closing mile relay in a stirring finish it made the final count a bit lopsided. The windup saw Troy's Bob Chambers and Larry Hoff of Stanford start the anchor leg all even. Hoff ran off to a five-yard lead but Chambers, living up to his "the horse" monicker, colared him at the head of the stretch and clung to a foot lead to the wire. He was clocked in

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48.4s. The Troy foursome of Wilson, Norm Stocks, Wells DeLoach and Chambers went the distance in 3m. 15.8s.

Powerful Gay Bryan did just about all they expected of him, and that was a long series of wows. He scored 18 points in five events with a first in the broad jump at 24ft. 1in.; tie for first in the high jump with SC's Jack Barnes at 6ft. 5in.; seconds in the 100 and 220 behind uncatchable Pell-Mel Patton of SC and second in the 220 low hurdles, splitting the mighty Troy duo of Ron Frazier and Al Lawrence.

Stiff Headwind

A stiff headwind prevented startling times to be recorded but Patton did equal the 100 standard of 9.6s. he holds jointly with Trojan Charles Paddock and Hec Dyer of Stanford.

Otis Chandler of Stanford topped a classy shot-put performance with 54ft. 11 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. Lew Davis put the 16-pound pellet

54ft. 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. for second and Bill Bayless, SC, was third with 52ft. 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ in.

The other field events produced good marks, too. Frank (Bud) Held of the Tribe flung the javelin 216ft. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. and a couple of Trojans, Dean Dillingham and Carl Henning, got off their best heaves to take the crucial second and third. Dillingham's mark measured 191ft. 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. and Henning's 190ft. 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ in.

Discus Tossers

The discus tossers were right at their peak, Steven McKee snaring first for Stanford with 151ft. 2in., Bayless next at 149ft., and Chandler third at 145 ft. $\frac{3}{4}$ in.

John Montgomery of SC cleared 14ft. 6in., loftiest of his career, to cop the pole vault as expected but the "unbreakable" Troy trio was invaded when Don Campbell of Stanford cleared 13ft. 6in. to share second place points with Al Zimmerman and John Rowan.

Patton bucked the breeze in the 220 and still did 21s. flat.

Unpredictable Dick Attlesley ran one of his best high hurdle races but had to take second behind Downing McKee of Stanford, who also outdid himself to win by a yard in 14.4s. Lawrence took third, which at that time loomed mighty large.
