

SC Spikers Easily Whip Cal, 88 to 42

Troy Power Too Much as Bears Bow at Berkeley

BERKELEY, April 22 —

SC's ever-conquering Trojans flew to Berkeley this morning and kept right on flying in the afternoon on Edwards Field oval as they sailed to a smashing 88 1-12-to-42 11-12 win over California's Golden Bears.

Brutus Hamilton's thinclads, who've knocked off the Southern Cals but once since 1924, were expected to make a fairly close meet of it, but the Trojans exhibited strength in previously shaky events to make a rout of the PCC duel.

Outside of such sure things as Sprinter Donnie Anderson and Spear Tossler George Roseme, the Bears came through in but one borderline event—the mile—and it gave a large gang of Bear rooters one of their few opportunities to roar during the afternoon.

Mello Takes Mile

Otherwise, it was a case of the Trojans displaying overwhelming strength in every event on the card as they added another PCC scalp to their fast-growing collection.

The mile was the No. 1 chiller on the day's fast-moving card. It was tabbed as a duel between Cal's Paul Mello and Troy's Wally Wilson, and that's just exactly how it turned out.

Mello grabbed the lead at the end of the first lap in the tremendous time of 60s. He stayed a couple of yards ahead of Wilson on the next two laps, finishing the third lap in 3m. 10s. Mello's margin remained two yards through the final lap as the Bear leather-lunger busted the tape in 4m. 15.4s., fastest mile on the Coast this season.

Mello's mellow mile, Anderson's twin win in the sprints and Roseme's 216ft. 5in. heave in the javelin were just about all the Berkeley boys had to crow about.

Stocks Sneaks In

But from a Trojan standpoint it was quite another tale. Norm Stocks, who's been tres slow in rounding into shape this season, went to the front of the pack early in the 440 and held on in the final yards to upset favored Don Jackson, who finished fourth. SC's Stan Mattoon, the former Fullerton Jaysee star,

sneaked in for a surprise second and the rout was on.

Cal's upset hopes took a further dip when the 100 came along a few minutes later. Anderson grabbed the top spot with ease as anticipated, but Trojans Al Mejia and Johnny Bradley chugged in for the place and show spots, shoving Cal's Roland Maples out of the money. Maples had been counted on by the Berkeley clan for the second-place berth.

Any upset hopes Cal may have harbored collapsed when the 120 high hurdles were run off. Dick Attlesey, who looked his classiest of the season, led Teammates Al Lawrence and Don Halderman to the final wire in 14.7s. Attlesey's disappointing time was the direct result of an 8 m.p.h. headwind which hampered the sprinters and hurdlers something awful.

From then on it was a Trojan romp, something which has become an old Saturday story.

Barely Misses

Next to the mile, the most interesting race on the program was the 880, in which Trojans Bob Chambers and Bob Pruitt, two of the nation's top half-milers, staged a wing-ding of a chase for two laps.

Pruitt grabbed an early lead and held it until 50 yards from home when Chambers put on one of his now famed gritty finishes to overtake Pruitt a few yards from the wire in 1m. 54s., eight-tenths of a second off Lou Zamperini's old meet mark.

SC's Henry Aihara got off his best broad jump of the season when he leaped 24ft. 7½in., missing Guy Manuel's meet mark by three-fourths of an inch.

Dick Brombach, Troy's sophomore ace from Long Beach, also got off his best of the year, high-jumping 6ft. 5in. to wrest first place from red-headed Jack Barnes.
