

SC Swamps Mich. State, Yale in Coliseum Meet

Southern California's Trojan tracksters staged one of the most devastating demonstrations of power ever seen on the cinders yesterday in rolling to an overwhelming triumph over Michigan State and Yale before 15,226 sun-baked fans in the Coliseum.

The Trojans tallied 96 points to 34 for runner-up Michigan State and 32 for Yale.

Brilliant as Jess Hill's gang was yesterday, the Trojans had to share top honors with Yale's jittery Jim Fuchs, who cracked the officially listed world's record in the shot-put with a tremendous heave of 58ft. 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ in.

The toss bettered Fuchs' unofficial world's mark of 58ft. 4 $\frac{27}{64}$ in., as well as the official world's record in the shot-put with a tremendous heave of 58ft. 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ in.

The 21-year-old Yale giant, who let out a louder roar than usual on the unprecedented heave, set the mark on his third attempt. Just before the throw he told the large assemblage of newsmen and photographers around the shot-put ring that he "was going to put his back into this one."

Later Fuchs said he thought the record-breaking toss was a poor one when it left his fingers because "the shot was so elusive getting away. I had no resistance on the toss."

On a Line

Resistance or not, the spectacular toss amazed the crowd because of its low line of trajectory. It was like a catcher making a rifle toss to second base. And it was the second time Fuchs, who has set his sights on the 60ft. mark, has bettered Fonville's world's mark.

Otherwise, it was strictly a Trojan show as Hill's wonders grabbed 11 of 15 first places and came through with seven bests for the season in submerging the highly regarded midwesterners and easterners.

Troy's brilliant effort was essentially a team triumph, but Bob Pruitt, Dick Attlessey, Jim Newcomb and Sim Iness are deserving of special mention.

Pruitt, who's finally come into his own this season, posted a new SC school mark in the 880 when he thrashed a brilliant field in 1m. 52s., best outdoor time of the season for the event. Bob Chambers, a favorite in the event, led the field at the end of the quarter with a sizzling 53.5s. effort.

Attlessey Hot

But it proved too fast for the Trojan workhorse as he faded coming off the final turn and allowed the field to romp past him. Meanwhile, Pruitt blazed the final 220, finishing four yards ahead of Yale's Henry Stolmann. Distance Stars Bill Mack, Michigan State, and George Wade, Yale, did not go in this event, choosing the two-mile instead.

Attlessey equaled his SC school mark in the highs in 14.1s. and came back for his finest effort in the lows—23.1s. It was the third time in his career Attlessey attempted the low sticks.

Iness Shines

Newcomb and Iness scored the day's biggest upsets. Newcomb, the Shawnee-Delaware Indian, left a brilliant field, which included Warren Druetzler and Bill Mack of Michigan State and George Wade of Yale, far behind in the two-mile.

The virtually untested Trojan sophomore was 30 yards ahead of Eli's Ted Mearns and 50 yards

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ahead of the Spartans' Druetzler, who was tired from a torrid mile effort. Newcomb's time, 9m. 22.9s., was the best of his young career.

Iness got his tremendous torso into a 168ft. 6½in. discus ef-

fort, best of his life, and good enough to beat both Vic Frank and Fuchs of Yale. Fuchs was second at 161ft. 11in., while Frank disappointed at 159ft. 11in.

The Spartans, who fell far below their expected point potential, had their best opportunity to cheer during the first running event on the card—the mile run. Here, Mack grabbed the lead just before the end of the second lap and stepped right out, winding up 10 yards ahead of Yale's Wade at the final wire.

Biggest thriller on the afternoon's card was the mile relay in which the Spartans' Jack Dianetti tore 47.4s. on the final lap to edge Norm Stocks by six inches at the tape. Dianetti, who was 10 yards behind to start the final lap, simply blazed the final 100.

Earlier the diminutive Dianetti had crept up on the inside to capture the open quarter in 48.6s. after trailing by 10 yards at the 220 mark.
