Lennart Strand, the bouncing Swedish distance ace, more than lived up to his advance billing last night as he ripped off the fastest mile in West Coast history—4m. 7.3s.—to highlight an evening of brilliant performances in the 11th annual Compton Invitational Track and Field Meet.

Not far behind, if at all, in the

honor-winning class was SC's smooth hurdling ace, Dick Attlesey, whose "easy does it" 120yard high barrier performance of 13.7s, was the third fastest race at this distance in history.

stellar field which accounted for
