

Stanford Nabs Second; Yale Third

Fuchs, McEwen Set New Records in Chilly Weather

MINNEAPOLIS, June 17—Coach Jess Hill and eight Trojan athletes latched on to SC's 14th NCAA team trophy by scoring 49 1-5 points here this chilly afternoon at Memorial Stadium in the 29th annual National Collegiate Track and Field championships.

Stanford University finished second with 28 points, while Yale University, considered to be the biggest threat to Troy, wound up third with 27 tallies.

Payton Jordan's Occidental Tigers placed eighth with 17 points and right behind was Choc Sportsman's San Diego State team with 14 1-3. Loyola University scored 10, UCLA had 8, while Santa Barbara College came up with 2 1-6.

Individual champions from the Southland were SC's Dick Attlessey, 14s. in the 120-yard high hurdles; Loyola's Bob Boyd, 8.8s. in the 100 yard dash; and San Diego's Bobby Smith, 14ft. 2 3/4 in. in the pole vault.

Meet Marks Fall

Two meet records tumbled during this afternoon's finals. Yale's jittery Jim Fuchs again broke his own NCAA record in the shot with a put of 56ft. 11 3/16 in. and finished third in the discus at 166ft. 6 1/2 in. Stanford's Otis Chandler, who also bettered the old meet mark in Friday's prelims, finished second, failing to improve on his throw of 56ft. 5 1/2 in.

Michigan's Don McEwen racked up another new NCAA standard with 9m. 1.9s. two-mile time. The Wolverine's clocking erased the old mark of 9m. 2.6s. set by Greg Rice in 1938.

How Troy Won

Troy's winning total, which approached its 55 2-5 points winning score last year at Los Angeles, was accomplished in the following manner:

Attlessey, first in the highs and second in the low hurdles; Sim Iness, second in the discus at 171ft. 2 3/4 in.; Henry Aihara, second in the broad jump at 25ft. 1 1/2 in.; Jim Newcomb, second in the two mile; Art Barnard, fourth in the high hurdles; Wally Wilson, fifth in the mile; and Jack Rowan and Walt Jensen, tie for fifth in the pole vault.

Newcomb figured in the most spectacular race of the day, the two-mile, when he ran out of gas against the fabulous McEwen of Michigan.

Newcomb Trounced

McEwen, a murderous pace-setter with a world of guts, backed up his midwestern supporters by killing off Newcomb on the second mile of the two-mile to win by 100 yards over the Chief in the meet record time of 9m. 1.9s.

Hill gave Newcomb instructions to stay right on McEwen's heels, but after the first mile of 4m. 30s., the Chief started to fade as the Michigan ace poured on the heat to the sustained cheers of the 10,000 fans.

McEwen increased his halfway margin of 10 yards to 25 after five laps, 50 at the mile-and-a-half, and 80 at the gun lap.

Newcomb's second-place time was 9m. 1.4s. as he fought off a

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determined bid by Herb Sempster of Kansas, who finished a scant two yards behind the Trojan.

Albana Shines

Headling the afternoon's show, as far as the Trojans were concerned, was Co-Captain Albana who became the fourth broad jumper in SC history to go over 25 feet when he leaped 25ft 1 1/2 in for a second spot behind Denver's Jerome Riffe. The first SC man in history to exceed 25 feet was Hill himself with a mark of 25ft. 9 1/2 in. in 1929.

The springy, little Japanese ace got his big one on the first jump of the final, beating his fourth-place preliminary mark by an even foot. Riffe, who was second to North Carolina's Bill Albana yesterday, came through with 25ft. 4 1/2 in. to cop the blue ribbon.

Albana captured individual high-point honors for the day with 22 digits. The North Carolina sensation won the low hurdles in 23.8s. Around the turn he took third behind Attlesoy and Notre Dame's Bill Fleming in the high and placed third in the broad jump at 24ft. 9 1/2 in.

Attlesoy Scores 16

Attlesoy was next with 16 points, while Yale's Jim Fuchs and California's Donnie Anderson both totaled 15.

Anderson topped second in both sprints, winding up 2 feet behind Boyd in the 200 and 1 1/2 yards in back of Texas' Charley Parker in the 220. Parker's winning time around a turn was 21.8s.

Occidental's Bill Parker and John Barnes, both among the pre-meet favorites in the 440 and 880, respectively, had to be satisfied with thirds in their specialties.

Parker never could reach Morgan State's George Rhoden, the national AAU champ, who went wire to wire in 47.2s. The Day Dash, running second all the way, succumbed to the closing rush of Rice's Tom Cox. Cox was two yards to the rear of Rhoden and about a foot ahead of Parker at the wire.

Brown Finishes Fast

Barnes was in good position all the way in the half and was only two yards back of Ohio State's Len Traux as the runners came into the home stretch. But Morgan State's Bill Brown came out of the pack and cut down both Barnes and Traux to become a two-yard winner in 1m. 31.2s., a new stadium record. The Occidental sophomore was about two and a half yards to the rear of Traux at the finish and barely edged Joe Deady of Georgetown to clinch the show spot.

The Tigers picked up five more points when Walt McKibben and Parker placed fourth and sixth, respectively, in the 220.

The 200-yard dash, run against the wind on the Saky Memorial Stadium circles, was taken impressively by Loyola's Boyd, a powerful-striding Negro speedster. Boyd took over at the 40-yard mark and steadily increased his margin to a 1 1/2 yard edge over California's Anderson at the tape, winning in 28.8s.

Smith Wins Again

Satisfied with his winning effort in the century, the Lion star decided to scratch from the 220.

Bobby Smith, San Diego State's diminutive hurdler, claimed his second straight NCAA title by going over 14ft. 2 1/2 in. on his last vault. Smith beat out George Mattos of San Jose State, Art Sherman of Rhode Island State, and George Appel of Yale, all of whom tied for second at 14 feet.

Attlesoy's try for a new record in the high flick's was doomed to disappointment when a brisk wind came up to hit the runners directly in the face.

However, Troy's World-Record-Holder still managed to come through with a 14s. effort to score by three yards over Notre Dame's Fleming. Yesterday the Trojan senior tied the meet standard with a time of 13.0s. in his heat.

Attlesoy Second

Attlesoy got off to a poor start in the low, and although he was gaining rapidly at the end, Albana had too much of a lead and was a two-yard winner.

SC's Wally Wilson pulled one of the biggest surprises of the meet by taking a fifth in the mile, won by Don Gehrmann of Wisconsin in the disappointing time of 4m. 12.4s. Wally's clocking was 4m. 27s.

Cy Young of UCLA represented the Bruins' eight-point total with a second in the javelin at 216ft. 1in. Bud Held of Stanford was first at 216ft. 8 1/2 in.

Santa Barbara's total of 2 1/2 points was gained by Willie Dancer who tied for third in the high jump at 6ft. 4 in. Also in the six-way tie were Joe Page and Jack Rasotto of San Diego. The winner was Vera McGrew of Rice at 6ft. 2 1/2 in.
