

TROY QUALIFIES 10 FOR NCAA FINALS

SEATTLE, June 15 (AP)—A gang of leggy gallopers who hadn't heard that Southern California owned the NCAA track meet put big Cornell and little Morgan State into the limelight in today's qualifying trials.

Even so, the mighty Trojans of SC squeezed the largest number of qualifiers, 10, into tomorrow's finals and were not shaken from their rating as favorites.

But only one man of Troy's defending National Collegiate championship team was able to take first in a prelim.

Hurdler Jack Davis won his heat in both low and high hurdles, cracking a Washington Stadium record for the tall timber with a time of 14s. flat.

Craig Dixon of UCLA set the old mark of 14.2s. in 1949.

Two other stadium marks tumbled as Jim Dillion of Auburn almost threw the discus out of the park and Cornell's Charlie Moore scooted over the low hurdles in record time of 23.1s. The previous low hurdle record was 23.2s. set in 1936 by Loren Benke of Washington State.

Dillion got off a flip of 167ft. 5½in., the best by a collegian this year. Previously he had rated second nationally to Cliff Anderson of Indiana, who qualified as third man today behind the Stanford decathlon star, Robert Mathias. The old stadium standard, set by Taylor Lewis of UCLA in 1949, was 164ft. 2¼in.

George Rhoden and Art Bragg led Morgan State into the contenders' circle with double vic-

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tories while Charles Moore and Meredith Gourline showed the way for Cornell.

Southern California qualified 10 men out of 13 entered in the afternoon's running of 10 elimination events. Cornell picked off six spots and Morgan State, UCLA and Michigan State five each. Indiana and Illinois each had four on the list of 81 qualifiers.

There were no preliminaries in the pole vault, high jump, mile or two-mile.

Rhoden, who could give striding lessons to race horses, failed in his ambition to better 47s. in the quarter-mile but he won his heat going away in 47 flat. He coasted later to a 20-yard triumph in his heat of the 220-yard dash. Bragg picked up victories in the 220 and the century. Sam LaBeach grabbed a fifth first for the Morgan State squad in the 440.

440 Triumph

Moore shouldered into the 440 picture with a triumph in the first heat and got another first with his record performance in the low hurdles. Gourline had a low-hurdle first and a broad-jump second.

Bunched and promising a torrid squabble for titles tomorrow were the shot putters and spear-throwers. Chuck Missfeldt of Oregon got off a javelin toss of 211ft. 3 1/2 in. on one of his first efforts to show the way for the spearmen. The next three men—Alan Reich of Dartmouth, John White of California and Robert Allison of Navy—were all within 2 feet of the leader.

Seven men qualified in each of the four field events.

Darrow Hooper of Texas A&M shoved the shot 53ft. 11 in. and five other men in the field bettered 50ft. Pary O'Brien, SC sophomore, was closest to Hooper at 53ft. 4 in.

Braun Jumper

Top effort in the broad jump was 24ft. 4 1/2 in. by George Brown of UCLA, who beat Gourline by only the length of a large toe.

Nine men were qualified in most of the running events, but the field was pared to 10 in the half mile and eight in the two hurdle events.

Only in the hurdles were the times indicative of possible national record efforts tomorrow, although both Rhoden and the fans hoped he will shave several tenths in the finals from his time in the 440.

Davis was only a tenth of

a second away from the NCAA high hurdle record held jointly by Dixon, Edward Dugger of Tufts and Dick Attlesey of Southern California. The NC2A low stick standard appears safe. It is 22.3s. and rates also as the world mark, set by Harison Dillard of Baldwin-Wallace in 1947.

Sprinter Al Mejia, Weightman Parry O'Brien and Half-miler Fred Wehking were the three Trojans failing to qualify. Mejia placed fifth in both his 100 and 220 dashes; Wehking was boxed in at one stage of his 880 heat and could get no better than sixth, and O'Brien's best toss in the discus was only 143ft. 6 1/2 in.

Rod Richards, UCLA's star sprinter, faded badly in both his dash heats to miss out for tomorrow's finals.

A major disappointment was the withdrawal of Andy Stanfield, Seton Hall's "one-man gang," from three of four events.

Stanfield, who had been shooting for the same four-event sweep that Jesse Owens scored in 1935 and 1936, was scratched from the 220-yard dash, broad jump and low hurdles. No reason was given, but it was assumed due to recurrence of an old leg muscle injury.

Stanfield Qualifies

Stanfield qualified in the 100-yard dash with a second-place heat time of 9.8s.—two-tenths of a second off the pace set by Jim Ford of Drake and Bragg.
