

# TROJANS TAKE 12TH PCC TITLE IN ROW

## Iness' Discus Mark Pared Quarter-Inch as Engineers Survey 183ft. 5¼in. Toss

EUGENE, Or., May 24 (AP)—Long-armed Sim Iness failed today in his attempt to crack the world discus record, but his Southern California teammates went on to win the annual Pacific Coast Conference track title.

Iness in four tries could not improve on the tremendous throw he made in the qualifying round yesterday, a throw that will be submitted for recognition as an American record.

### Engineers Check It

Meet officials got confirmation from engineers that it was farther than any man previously had thrown the discus in this country. It was surveyed at 183ft. 5¼in., which is a quarter-inch less than officials had measured it by tape yesterday.

No other records were broken. Southern California piled up 62½ points, Stanford 35, California 30 5/6, UCLA 20, Washington State 19½, Oregon 19, Oregon

State 18½, Washington 14, Idaho 6.

For the Trojans it was their 12th consecutive title. They won seven events and tied for first in another. No other team approached that. UCLA and Washington State each won two events, Oregon State, Idaho and Oregon, one each.

Oregon also gained a tie with SC in the high jump.

### Sutton Upsets Dope

Jack Davis, SC's outstanding hurdler, was the only double winner. He won with ease in both low and high hurdles.

There were a couple of surprises. Bob Gary of Washington State provided one in the 100-yard dash, giving the favored Rod Richard of UCLA his first conference defeat of the season. Gary won in 9.9, running into a 6-mile-an-hour breeze. Richard came back later, however, to win the 220-yard dash, in which Gary finished fifth.

provided the other surprise in the javelin event. Before this meet the best he ever had been able to achieve was 201 feet. Yesterday he suddenly threw 215 feet and today he won by whipping the javelin 224ft. 2¼in. Chuck Missfeldt, the favorite from Oregon, was second at 223ft. 10in. Sutton's sudden blossoming moves him up to consideration as an Olympic team candidate.

John Bradley of SC won the 440-yard run for the second straight year, but had to turn in his best performance of the season to do it. Pete Dufour of Washington led three-fourths of the way around the track, but Bradley came on with a final rush to win in 48.4 seconds.

Art Garcia of SC also won as expected in the mile, but he too was forced to his best effort of the year. He caught Bob Simon of Stanford in the last 100 yards and beat him to the tape by two steps. The time was 4:12.5.

## Garcia Drops Out

Similarly Al Fisher of Washington State turned in his best performance of the year to win the two-mile run. He overtook Bob Reed of Stanford on the last lap and won in 9:24.7. Garcia, running in the ruck, pulled up lame after a mile and dropped out.

SC's other wins were by Parry O'Brien in the shot-put and by the mile relay team.

## Hutchins Wins

The high-jump tie was between Emery Barnes of Oregon and Manuel Ronquillo of SC at 6ft. 5½in.

George Brown, UCLA's prize broad jumper, was not up to his

best, but he won with a jump of 24ft. 9½in. to defend successfully the title he won last year.

Lon Spurrer of California appeared to be a cinch victor in the 880-yard run until the last turn. Then Jack Hutchins of Oregon cut loose with a spurt that brought him from 20 yards behind to nip Spurrer at the tape in 1:54.

Dave Martindale of Idaho upset the favored Lyle Dickey of Oregon State in the pole vault, jumping 14ft. 2¼in. Dickey went 14ft.
