

# San Jose Surprise Second

EDWARDS FIELD, Berkeley, June 14—There are 47 other States in the Union besides California, but so far as the National Collegiate Track and Field Championships held here today are concerned, it doesn't mean a thing.

Eight meet records were broken or tied in the two days. Just look at these facts, unfolded this fine afternoon before 16,500 spectators who saw the Sunkist lads of the Golden State far out-shadow all the rest:

University of Southern California won the meet with 66 7-12 points.

## Other California Schools

A quartet of other California schools, San Jose State with 24½, UCLA with 24¼, and Stanford and Occidental with 24 each, took the next four places.

Eight of the 18 individual championships were won by Californians, and that includes the hammer throw held at Boston a week ago.

Five of the eight marks broken or tied here went to California's great array of stars. A ninth record came in the hammer toss.

## Four New Marks

Four new records were added to the books this afternoon and one was tied as the field event mark breakers of yesterday failed to improve the three they posted in the qualifying round. The new ones were:

800 meters—John Barnes of Occidental, 1:49.6.

1500 meters—Bob McMillen, Occidental, 3:50.7.

110-meter high hurdles—Jack Davis, Southern California, 14 flat. (Ties record.)

400-meter hurdles—Bob Deviney, Kansas, 52.1.

5000 meters—Wes Santee, Kansas, 14:36.3.

Yesterday's three records were:

Shot-put — Parry O'Brien, Southern California, 57ft. ¾in.

Javelin—George Roseme, California, 228ft. 8¾in.

Hop, step and jump—George Shaw, Columbia, 49ft. 1¾in.

## Southland Victory

Just as the meet was a great California triumph, so was it a terrific Southern California victory. When the last stop watch was snapped the results showed Southland athletes had won six titles and finished second in four other events.
