

Sim Cracks American Plate Record

PALO ALTO, April 11—

Big Sim Iness shattered his own American record in the discus and Southern California rolled to an unexpectedly easy victory over Stanford today in their dual meet renewal before 9,000 sun-warmed fans in the Stanford Stadium.

Iness uncoiled his 6-foot 4-inch frame for a 183ft. 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. toss.

His American record set last spring in the PCC meet at Eugene, Or., was 183ft. 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. Today's performance missed Fortune Gordien's world mark of 188ft. 11in., set in Finland, by less than 18 inches.

Records Shattered

Southern Cal's victory count of 79 $\frac{1}{2}$ points to 51 $\frac{1}{2}$ was unexpected only by the size of the margin. And since the Trojans have a history of doing better than expected on the cinder path and almost never worse, even today's runaway shouldn't have surprised anyone.

Even before most of the fans were in the big stadium SC's Parry O'Brien had launched the record assault which saw three meet records tumble and two Trojan school marks established.

Iness' great performance was a new SC mark, of course, and O'Brien twice broke his own SC shot-put record of 57ft. 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ in.

Parry's three measured tries today were 58ft. 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., 57ft. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., and 57ft. $\frac{1}{2}$ in. The second mark won the event and is an achievement bettered by only two men in shot-put history — world record-holder Jim Fuchs and Charley Fowlie.

Davis Clips Mark

Iness cracked his own meet mark in the discus but O'Brien bettered a 1940 meet standard with his great shot-putting. Stanford's Stan Andersen having held the old 55ft. 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. record.

The other meet record fell to Jack Davis, SC's third Olympian, as he clipped over the high hurdles in 14 flat, two-tenths better than Phil Cope's effort for SC in 1938. Davis also won the lows as anticipated.

But performances by SC's big three are expected to be outstanding. What set the victory pace for Jess Mortensen's warriors were the come-through achievements of such boys as Darel Griffin in the 440 to start the Stanford downfall; Verle Bergen in the sprints, broad jump and relay; Bill Sweet in the 880 and Dick Adams in the two-mile. All scored unexpected points.

Lea Lopes In

The mile had followed form with Bob Simon winning for the Indians. But the 440 came next and Stanford hoped to get second and third behind Jim Lea.

Instead of that it was Lea easily in 48.6 and Griffin rushing up at the finish to beat out Walt Garrett by five yards for the place spot. Garrett barely broke 50 flat where a week ago he did 48.7 and thus SC had eight points instead of the expected five.

Sorgen had a fine outing. In the 100, with Joe Graftio winning in a sparkling 9.7, Sorgen finished fast for a third spot and just missed catching Keith Brownsberger for second. Verle overtook Maury Parsons for a point. He came through to win the broad jump. He was a strong finisher to take second in the 220, where Lea was completing his splendid double. And he legged a good 48.7 relay lap.

Sweet Takes Third

Sweet wasn't expected to cut any ice in the 880 but there he was in third spot at 1:57.8 and finishing full of run where a week ago he tired badly. Simon finished his double here in 1:55.2 and later tried the two mile but couldn't finish.

Adams ran his best-ever two mile and gave Stanford's Bob Reed a good tussle to get second spot in 9:37.

These were the boys who supplied the surplus points.

Stanford's Bob Mathias had a bad day. On his first try at the broad jump, where he didn't

figure to be any help to the Indians anyway, he wrenched his back, suffering a muscle spasm similar to one he had last football season.

He tried high-jumping but did just 6ft. and was unplaced. He was fourth in the high hurdles but he come up with a 51ft. 11in. shot-put on his only try (before broad-jumping) for a third place and also placed third in the discus with a 165ft. 11in. effort, beaten a little more than a foot by O'Brien. He stayed out of the low hurdles.

SC's complete relay lap times were: John Morgan 50.2; Roger Hendrix, 49.8; Sorgen, 48.7, and Lea, 48.3 Lea emerged the high-

point man with the 440 and 220 wins and the winning relay anchor spot.
