Toss Sets

NCAA Mark

LINCOLN, Neb., June 19.

Sim Iness of Southern California completely stole the show from the nation's best runners in the trials of the NCAA track and field championships here this evening.

Big Sim, the Olympic discus champ, sailed the four-and-a-half pound platter 183ft. even to break the only record in this first day of the two-day meet.

Records Nullified

A wind that started at 5 m.p.h. and got up as high as 60 m.p.h. nullified a pair of record-equaling performances on the University of Nebraska's cinder track by SC's Jack Davis and Illinois' Willie Williams.

Although the Illini, Big Ten champs, qualified one more man into tomorrow's finals than did the Trojans, the meet still appears to be in the bag for Coach Jess Mortensen's boys.

Illinois moved up nine men, SC eight, followed by Michigan and Stanford with five. UCLA put two men in the finals.

Davis Does 13.9

Davis breezed his heat in the 120-yard high hurdles in 13.9 but will not get credit for a share of the meet record because of a 7 m.p.h. tail wind. Williams nipped Kansas State's Thane Baker in a 100 semifinal in 9.4, but that won't go down as a meet record either, due to wind assistance.

After weeks of indecision Baker finally decided this afternoon to forego the 440 in favor

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of the 100. Trojans' Jim Lea and Verle Sorgen got through two rounds of 440 heats easily this evening and might run 1-2 in the final.

While the wind was blowing the runners all over the track, many of the 3000 in attendance leaned over the side of the big Memorial Stadium grandstand to watch Sim whirl the discus on the back 40 acres.

Way Past Record

Two of his four preliminary throws were in the 182-183-foot vicinity, almost 10 feet farther than the old record set at Palo Alto in 1941 by Indiana's Archie Harris. Inness and the six other qualifiers will get three more throws apiece in the finals tomorrow.

Sim said his teeth still ached today from the blow that knocked out two and chipped four others, but he threw better than he has for two months.

A good second in the disc was Trojan Parry O'Brien with a heave of 173ft. 8in. O'Brien was far off his world record-breaking form in his favorite

event, the shot, putting only 56ft. 7½in. He, too, will get three more tries tomorrow to get up to the 59-foot radius.

Rod Richard of UCLA got into both sprint finals, making it easily in the 100, but by the skin of his teeth in the 200. Richard ran second to California's Guy Blackburn in a 9.8 semifinal in the 100. In the 200 he made the final by being the fastest of three third-place men. He was clocked in 21.4 around a turn and through a gale. He was the only Bruin to come through today.

Clyde Wetter failed to reach the 50-foot mark that would have put him in the shot final and Jack Sage waited too long to begin his kick in the first 880 heat. He placed fifth and four qualified.

The 880 heats, much ballyhooed as record-breakers because of the ambitions of Kansas, Wes Santee and San Jose's Lang Stanley, was rather disappointing. Santee won the first heat easily in 1:52.4 but made no attempt to chase the meet mark of 1:50.3. Stanley got only fourth in the other trial which Illinois' Stacey Siders won in 1:54.6.

Hurdlers Miss

Davis moved up in the low hurdles also, but two other Trojan hurdlers, Willard Wright and Leon Clarke, failed to make the grade.

Joe Graffio ran a good trial heat in the 100 but was squeezed out in the semifinal round.

Mortensen's most pleasant surprise this evening came in the second round of the javelin when Dick Genter found a favorable current of air and sent the javelin out on it for 211ft. ¾in., a mark almost 10 feet better than Genter has ever done before. Ray Bocker of Loyola of the South tossed the spear 211ft. 1in., just an eighth of an inch beyond Genter.
