

Five Trojans Capture Six NCAA Titles

LINCOLN, Neb., June 20 (AP)—A discus throw that exceeded the world record, the second fastest mile ever run by an American and a new meet record for the shot kept a crowd of 15,000 well entertained here tonight in the 32nd annual National Collegiate track and field meet.

Big Sim Iness of Southern California made the discus throw of 190ft. $\frac{3}{4}$ in., 4ft. $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. better than the accepted world mark of 185ft., 11in. by Fortune Gordon, of Minnesota, made in a meet in Finland in 1949.

Friday Iness had thrown the discus 183ft. for a new NCAA

Six Titles for Troy

SC's cast of record-breakers tied yet another NCAA mark yesterday at Lincoln, Neb., by capturing six individual titles. Trojan winners were:

record. A week ago in California he had been hit in the mouth by a stray discus.

Southern California rang up 80 points to 41 for Illinois, the second place team, in registering its fifth straight NCAA team title.

The second fastest mile by an American was hung up by the Kansas Cowboy Wes Santee, who also is the fellow who ran the fastest American mile. His fastest time is 4:02.4 made not long ago in California and his time tonight was 4:03.7 in a race he won by 25 yards.

Wes Skips 880

The Kansan took the lead early on the third lap after starting fourth from the outside in the second row. Once he moved in front it was but a question of time—*not* whether he would win. But the race and a terrific effort in the 880 Friday when the heat was terrific and the wind strong, took a lot out of Santee and he scratched from the 880.

It was explained Santee was five pounds underweight and "plain tired out."

The shot-put meet record came from Parry O'Brien, also of Southern California, and traveled 58ft. $7\frac{1}{4}$ in. The old record of 57ft. $\frac{1}{2}$ in. also belonged to O'Brien. It was set last year. But it's not his best for he has a 59ft. $2\frac{1}{2}$ in. throw, made earlier this year, up for recognition as a world mark.

Davis Doubles

The only double win of the meet finals went to Jack Davis, Southern California's hurdler, who took the highs in 14 and the lows in 23.3, both easily. Davis' work, with that of O'Brien, Iness and a crew of other fine lads, resulted in a romp to the team title for the coast school.

Dick Genter of Southern California provided the biggest surprise of the meet when he won the javelin throw at 216ft. $9\frac{1}{4}$ in. Before this week end Genter's all-time best in the event was 202ft. $3\frac{1}{4}$ in. He was second in yesterday's trials at 211ft. $\frac{3}{4}$ in. and improved upon that performance tonight.

Genter was a last-minute addition to the Trojan squad.

Mile Gallop

The mile run—the one the fans had gathered for—started with Santee running in sixth place at the end of the quarter

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with the leader's time at 58 seconds. At the end of the second lap Santee was beginning to pull up and was third as they went into the third lap. Time at the end of the second lap was 2:03.

Entering the third lap, the smooth-running Kansas ace turned on his full steam and after rounding the turn went out in front to move away fast. The third lap closed with the time 3:04 and the crowd wildly cheering Santee.

Williams Flies

At one time in the fourth lap Santee was about 35 or 40 yards ahead of the field, closing with a 25-yard victory.

Another race that drew cheers from the spectators was the 100 which went to Willie Williams of Illinois in 9.7. Williams seemed to fly away from the mark and never was headed as he racked up another win over Thane Baker of Kansas State.

It was the first time that Baker has been beaten in a finals race this year. He had lost two preliminary heats, one to Williams by a whisker Friday.

In the 880 Lang Stanley of San Jose State made a fast finish to win in 1:52.4 after having just qualified Friday with a fourth place in his heat. This was a race in which the fans had hoped to see Santee matched with Stanley.

Three Tie

In the high jump Milton Mead, Michigan; Louis (Papa) Hall, Florida; and Mark Smith, Wayne, tied at 6ft. 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. They tried to break the tie at 6ft. 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., but nobody could clear that height.

The pole vault went to Fred Barnes of Fresno State who cleared 14ft. 6in. and tried for a record at 14ft. 10in. without success. If he had cleared that height he could have broken the existing mark by a quarter of an inch.
