

Parry Cracks World Shot Record Again; Barthel 2nd in 4:09

Wes Santee ran the third fastest mile of all time, 4:00.7, but the handsome giant from Santa Monica, Parry O'Brien, supplied the world record last night in the SPAAU track and field meet at the Coliseum.

O'Brien hit 60ft. 10in. in his sixth and final try. He also had a 60ft. 6in. put and two others beyond 60ft. His two best surpassed his unofficial world record of 60ft. 3 1/4 in. set at the Coliseum a month ago.

A crowd of 9,000 fans watched the local track finale and gasped at the spectacular shotputting by O'Brien, then cheered madly at Santee as he circled the track on the final lap with a chance at a new world's mile record.

Santee ran away from Joey Barthel in the final 220 yards.

The Olympic Games 1500-meter champion from Luxembourg was timed in 4:09 as he finished more than 50 yards back of the Kansan.

Barthel Steps Out

Santee, who shattered his American mile record a week ago at Compton with a 4:00.6 mile time, was battering at the door of Robert Bannister's world 3:58.4 record last night.

At 1:30 Santee and Barthel were nearly dead even and just as they headed into the final lap Barthel stepped ahead of his American rival. They were timed in 3:00 there.

Barthel had a stride on Santee going into the backstretch. But midway down the north-side run, Santee raced ahead.

By the time they reached the 1500-meter mark, Santee had nearly 30 yards on Barthel. Wes was timed there in 3:43.4, 8c. slower than his time to that point a week ago at Compton.

His unofficial lap times were 59.5, 60, 60.5, 60.7.

He was wearing a long-sleeved white shirt last night under his track jersey to hold off the chill evening air. There was no appreciable wind.

Santee Moves Up

"I thought the track was a trifle heavy," Santee said. "The cold didn't bother me tonight."

"I'm through running for the summer and will start again in the fall. I was really working that final 100 yards tonight."

Barthel said it was too early in his campaign for his best race.

Paul Carlin, an added entry from Wyoming, set the first 400 pace at 58.3 with Barthel and Santee close behind. Santee moved into second on the next lap and at the 880 Sture Landqvist of Oklahoma A&M was the leader in 1:59.4. On the backstretch of that lap Santee went into first place and held it to the 1320 mark when Barthel went ahead.

With a mark of 3:00 to that point Santee was well within reach of Bannister's record. But he needed a finishing lap like the Englishman's 58.9 and he couldn't produce it.

Third Time

O'Brien's tremendous display marked the third meet this year he has been beyond 60ft. The first occasion was in the UCLA-SC dual meet, the next at the Coliseum Relays and last night was the third. He has bettered his official world record of 58ft. 3 1/4 in. several times in every meet during recent weeks.

His series of tries last night were:

57ft. 5in.; 58ft. 1/2 in.; 60ft. 3 1/4 in.; 60ft. 6in.; 60ft. 5in. and 60ft. 10in.

Thus he was beyond 60ft., once regarded as the ultimate in shot-putting, on four occasions.

Another shot-put record fell for Ray Martin, the SC-bound Valley JC athlete, bettered the national jaycee record with a

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Noren's Hit Gives Yanks 3-2 Victory

NEW YORK, June 11 (AP)

Irv Noren lashed a two-out single in the eighth inning which scored Phil Rizzuto with the run that gave the New York Yankees a 3-2 victory over the Chicago White Sox tonight.

The loss was the first for the White Sox in their last eight games and cut their league lead to half a game over the Cleveland Indians.

Second Pitch

The White Sox had chosen to pitch to Noren, rather than Yogi Berra who had homered in the fourth inning. Berra was walked intentionally by Mike Fornieles after Rizzuto had walked, stolen second and moved to third on an infield grounder. Noren hit the second pitch into center field.

The hit was the first off Fornieles, who replaced Starter Don Johnson at the start of the fifth inning.

Chicago had tied the score in the fifth inning after New York moved into a 3-0 lead. The White Sox runs scored on a bases-loaded single by Nellie Fox.

Pop Fly

Sherm Lollar opened the fifth with a single and moved to second as Gerry Coleman threw wide on Jim Rivera's grounder. After Johnny Groth struck out Plach Hitter Phil Cavaretta walked and Chiro Carrasquel struck out before Fox hit into right field.
