

Shelton, Lea Spark Troy to NCAA Crown---66 Pts.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., June 12.

High-jumping Ernie Shelton and fast-running Jimmy Lea led Southern California to its 18th national collegiate track and field championship on Ferry Field this afternoon despite the efforts of 92 other colleges from all corners of the nation.

Shelton gave the crowd of 10,500 its top thrill late in the afternoon when he cleared the high jump bar three times at

wind, leaving the field five yards behind.

Coach Jess Mortensen's Trojan team tallied 66 17/20 points to more than double the score of runner-up Illinois at 31 17/20. The total did not quite come up to last year's winning figure of 80 points or the record high of 102 set by the 1936 Trojans.

The University of California was third with 27 points followed by Texas at 19 and the host Michigan team at 17 3/5. Stanford finished eighth with 15 points while Fresno State got five points, San Diego got 1/2 and UCLA, Occidental and Whittier did not get a point.

Four Seconds

Last year the Trojans got a record six first-place medals mainly due to the efforts of Olympians Jack Davis, Parry O'Brien and Sim Iness.

With that triumvirate gone, Mortensen came up with a new group of scorers who must have set some kind of a mark in garnering four second places.

Jon Arnett got his longest broad jump, a 24ft. 8 1/2 in. effort, to pick up a surprise silver medal behind Defending Champ John Bennett of Marquette who passed Arnett on his last leap — a 25ft. 10 1/2 in. effort.

Joe Graffio followed another defending champ, Illinois' Willie Williams, into the 100-yard finish tare with a 9.6 performance. Will Wright ran 14.3 to take second to Willard Thomson of the Illini in the high hurdles, and Des Koch hung onto second place in the discus with a 169ft. 4 1/2 in. throw.

Leon Patterson moved up to third in the discus with an excellent 169ft. 3/4 in. throw while Jim Dillion of Auburn was improving his winning mark to 176ft. 3 in. N

Rod Wilger, the late-season surprise of the Trojan team ran into third in the 220 in 21.1 behind Charles Thomas, 20.7. Sophomore Mike Larrabee was another one of Mortensen's come-through performers with a 4.78 timing for fifth in the 440.

The fractions in SC's point total were the result of Jack Findley's tie for sixth in the high jump at 6ft. 4 1/2 in. and Wally Levack's tie for fifth in the pole vault at 13ft. 6 in.

Not a single new meet mark was established although Shelton, Lea, Williams and Pitt's Arnie Sowell came close.

Sowell defeated a talented

Longshot Scores

Little Oregon Sophomore Bill Dellinger was a longshot winner of the day in the mile. He put on a 57-second last lap to pass 11 men and break the tape in 4:13. Little Kikuo Moriya, a Japanese exchange student at Wheaton College under Coach Gil Dodds, was a popular winner in the two-mile, upsetting the favored Gene Mathews of Purdue and Defending Champ Rich Ferguson of Iowa in 9:22.7.

Larry Anderson, the California junior from Glendale, split the pole vault title with a Florida soph, Earl Poacher, at 14ft. 2in. John Stellern and Charley Butt, the big Golden Bears from Pasadena and San Gabriel, were moved down into the second and third spots in the shot on the last round by a 54ft. 2 3/4in. put by Miami's Tom Jones.

Stanford's Leo Long won the javelin as expected with a 226ft. 6 1/2in. throw ahead of the University of Puerto Rico's first entry in an NCAA meet, Reinaldo Oliver.

Ties Owens' Mark

The remaining blue ribbon in the big meet was won by Illinois' Joe Corley who sped to a 22.8 time in the low hurdles. This equaled Jesse Owens' field record which stood for a world mark for 12 years.

The distance contingent from the Southland couldn't stand the Midwest heat today. Oxy's Claude Fiddler dropped out of the two-mile after two laps, while SC's Fernando Ledesma toured the track only three times before succumbing to 80-deg. heat.

In the mile Whittier's Russ Bonham was 12th in 4:22 with SC's Marty Montgomery back at 4:28.5 and Oxy's Terrill further back at 4:34.8. Eddie Shinn of Oxy ran out of the money with a 1:37 half-mile.
