Ernie Shelton passed one more landmark last night in his drive toward the world's record in the high jump.

The SC senior successfully negotiated 6ft. 11% in. at the Coliseum, thereby breaking a record for the stadium field set 14 years ago by Oregon's Les Steers at 6ft. 11in. When Steers cleared that height it was a world record performance, and it remained there for 12 years until Walter Davis hoisted it to the present 6ft. 111/2 in. record two vears ago.
