Coast Win

Big Ten Routed, 75-57, as Trojan Sets College Mark

EDWARDS STADIUM,
Berkeley, June 21 — With
Trojan Fernando Ledesma
and Bruin Bob Seaman lead-
ing the way, the Pacific
Coast Conference defeated
the Big Ten, 75-57, in the
14th annual interconference
dual meet this evening be-
fore 7500.

Ledesma, the slim, unpre-
dictable junior of Southern
California, set a new U.S. col-
legiate record in the two-mile
at 8:57.7, breaking the 8:58.0
record set by Wes Santee of
Kansas last year.

Seaman Does 4:04.2

Seaman gained his first vic-
tory over Oregon's Bill Del-
linger in a great mile race.
The UCLA sophomore's time
of 4:04.2 is the fastest winning
time by any American, save
Santee. Dellinger, 1954 NCAA
mile champ who beat Seaman
in both the conference and
national meets this spring,
was second, timed in 4:04.6,
which makes him the No. 4
miler in U.S. track annals.

The Big Ten forces, weak-
ened last Saturday in Los An-
geles by the loss of double
hurdle champ Willard Thom-
son of Illinois, suffered another
setback in the opening
event as Jim Golliday of
Northwestern, the current
"world's fastest human,"
pulled up with an injured
thigh muscle in scoring the
Big Ten's sprint relay team
to victory.

Passes Sprints

Golliday had to scratch out
of both the 100 and 220, which
were won by Minnesota's Har-
ry Nash in 9.7 and 21.1.

Ledesma trailed a fairly
fast pace for the opening mile
of the eight-lap event and
then set out by himself to run
an amazing 4:21.8 second
mile. This great effort came
just three days after Ledesma
had turned in a 9:13.1 time to
finish out of the money in the
NCAA meet.

The Trojan star from Comp-
ton ran an 8:56.4 two-mile
three weeks ago, but since it
was a nonwinning effort be-
hind Horace Ashenfelter's
new American record of 8:49.6
it could not be considered as
an American college standard.

Finishing third, quite a

way behind Ledesma and UCLA's Bobby Hunt, was Oregon's NCAA Champ Ken Reiser.

For both Reiser and Dellinger it is their first losses of the year to other than a teammate. The third of the Web-

foots' great triumvirate, Jim Bailey, remained unbeaten as he dropped down to the half mile and won convincingly in 1:51. He defeated both Dellinger and Seaman in the National Collegiate mile Saturday.

Closest race of the day was the dead-heat .440 between SC's Mike Larrabee and Michigan State's British Empire Champ Kevan Gosper in 47.4.

It was the Coast's ninth win against five for their Midwestern rivals.
