

ELLIS RUNS 47.2 MILE RELAY LAP

UCLA's Russ Ellis turned in a sizzling 47.2 anchor lap yesterday in the mile relay to give the Bruins an upset victory in the feature race of the annual SC-UCLA relays at Westwood.

Ellis, who placed third in the NCAA 440 in 1955, made up 15 yards on Troy's anchor man Chuck Kirkby and won with yards to spare.

The actual winner of the mile relay was an unattached

on SC's Max Truex, leaving Seaman within striking distance of Troy's Sid Wing at the gun lap.

It wasn't a Bruin show, despite these two smashing relay wins. The Trojans walked off with the two sprint relays and the two-mile relay. SC also captured the shot put, broad jump, pole vault and javelin, where total distance or height determined the victor.

Johnson Wins Highs

Rafer Johnson, UCLA's world decathlon record holder, who has been bothered by a bruised instep, competed in only four events. He won the 120 high hurdles, clocking 14.6.

SC's Ray Martin and UCLA's Don Vick picked up their shot-put rivalry where they left off last year. Vick drew first blood for 1956, heaving the iron ball 55ft. 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. to Martin's 54ft. 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in.
