

# SC Third as Kansas Runner-up

BERKELEY, June 16 — UCLA won its first NCAA track and field championship today. But it may be its last for quite a while.

Because if the Pacific Coast Conference's suspension of the Bruins from NCAA competition sticks, the Bruins won't be able to enter this meet for the next three years.

Eight courageous Bruins brought Coach Ducky Drake the national championship today as they scored 55 7-10 points in an amazing series of come-through performances on the field.

## Trojans Third

Second was Kansas with 50 points and third the defending champions from SC with 34½, some 20 points less than the Trojans had been figured for. Michigan State was fourth with 23.

The meet produced one new American record, another American mark equaled, nine meet standards and a pair of brilliant sprint victories by Bobby Morrow of Abilene Christian College of Texas.

## Sime Hurt

Morrow won the 100 meters from famed Dave Sime of Duke by two yards in 10.4 and took the 200 meters around a curve in 20.6, matching the best time in U.S. history, as Sime pulled up with an injured muscle in his left groin. This will keep him out of the national AAU meet next week and may prevent him from competing in the final American tryouts two weeks hence.

UCLA was paced by its great all-around star Rafer Johnson, who finished second with his fastest-ever hurdle flight and also was second in the broad jump for 16 points. And Don Vick, who had ranked sixth in the shot and seventh in the discus after the preliminaries yesterday, pulled himself up to fourth and second, respectively, for 12 points.

## Bruin Points

For UCLA Ron Drummond won the discus and Nick Dyer tied for first in the high jump. Hal Miller figured in a 10-way tie for fourth in the high jump. Dick Knaub placed sixth in the broad jump. Russ Ellis was fourth in the 400 and Bob Seaman fourth in the 1500 meters.

The high jump points were largely unexpected but basically it was Johnson and Vick who were the Bruin heroes.

SC's cause had appeared lost yesterday when Max Trues dropped out of the 10,000 meters, but Trojan fortunes sank lower and lower today.

Mike Larrabee was unplaced in the 400 meters, finishing seventh, and the Trojans failed to score at all in the 800 meters where they had counted heavily upon Chuck Kirkby and Murray Coburn.

Kirkby finished a strong third in 1:50.2, his fastest

ever, but was disqualified for elbowing on the back stretch and Coburn was a trailing seventh in 1:54.2.

Trojan field eventers did about as expected, and Doug Maijala did even better, finishing second behind Caltech's Phil Conley who pitched the spear 239ft. 11in. today. Maijala raised his mark to 229ft. 10in.

Arnie Sowell ran away with the 800 meters in 1:46.7, fastest ever by an American. The lithe Pittsburgher, who had failed to qualify for the finals last year at the NCAA meet in Los Angeles, didn't make any errors of judgment today.

#### **Brew Elbowed**

He shot to the front at the first turn and covered the first lap in 51.1 with a huge lead of 15 yards on Lang Stanley of San Jose. Stanley was never able to get any closer, and was timed in a creditable 1:49.2 for second. Kirkby elbowed Doug Brew of Dartmouth who was given third position.

Sowell's time was a tenth faster than Tom Courtney's U.S. record and sets up a great race in the Olympic tryouts at the Coliseum between these two.

Morrow was a tremendously impressive victor in the sprints.

In the 100, after three false starts by the jittery field—the fastest college sprint group ever assembled—Mike Agostini of Fresno State was an early leader, but before they had covered 40 yards Morrow had a clear lead with daylight separating him from the other.

#### **Sime Second**

Agostini appeared from the press box to have won second place, but the judges gave the spot to Sime. His time was 10.6, same as Agostini's. California's Leamon King, off to a slower start than usual, finished fourth at 10.7, as they bucked a 5.5 m.p.h. wind.

In the 200 meters, Sime pulled up at the 100-yard point. It appeared, however, that Morrow was ahead of him at the time.

The list of meet records, in addition to the 800 and 200, included the 10,000, hammer throw, shot, 1500 meters, 3000-meter steeplechase, 110-meter high hurdles, hop, step and jump and 400-meter hurdles.

#### **Last-Lap Duel**

The anticipated 1500-meter duel between the four-minute milers, Ron Delany of Villanova and Jim Bailey of Oregon, produced a victory for the Irishman, Delany, after a furious last-lap duel.

Early lap times were slow. Don Bowden of California led after three laps in 3:08.2. But for the final 440 yards Delany was clocked in 54.1 and Bailey in 54.4.

Bailey had been second most of the way, but Delany shot past him with a furlong to go and they took off for the tape like a couple of sprinters. But Delany proved the stronger.

Delany was clocked in 3:47.3, well under Bob McMillen's 3:50.7 set in 1952.

#### **Seaman Surprised**

Sid Wing of SC surprised UCLA's Seaman at the tape to get third spot in 3:49.7.

One of the more impressive record performances was the high hurdle win by Lee Calhoun of North Carolina College in 13.7 with Rafe Johnson very, very close. It was big Rafe's most impressive hurdle flight and going over the last stick he was just about even with Calhoun.

J. W. Mashburn was given the verdict over Penn's John Haines in the 400, although they virtually dead heated in 46.4.

In the discus, where the Bruins scored those big 18 points, Vick improved nearly 10 feet, from 161ft. 11in. to 171ft. 5in. in the finals. The favorite, Al Oerter of Kansas, finished only fourth behind SC's Rink Babka.
