

Villanova Captures NCAA

AUSTIN, Tex., June 15—Bob Gutowski, the slender, steel-sinewed chemistry student from Occidental College in Los Angeles, vaulted higher than any man in history here tonight by clearing 15ft. 9 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. to shatter his own world record.

Gutowski's tremendous effort highlighted the NCAA track and field championships.

The 6ft. 150-pounder from La Jolla, Cal., who'd set a world standard of 15ft. 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. in a dual meet against Stanford April 27, soared over the new ceiling on his first try after clinching first place with a vault of 15ft. 5in. It was Gutowski's 31st trip over 15 feet.

Gutowski tried 16 feet three times. Twice he cleared the bar, but knocked it off the uprights on his way down.

Former High

The previous high for a vault was the 15 ft. 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. standard established indoors by Cornelius Warmerdam in 1943. Warmerdam's best outdoor mark was 15 ft. 7 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. in 1942.

California's Don Bowden

bettered the existing record in the 880 when he toured the distance in 1:47.2, under the 1:47.5 recognized mark established by another Golden Bear, Lon Spurrier, in 1955, but still behind the 1:46.8 pending world mark registered by Tom Courtney of Army in May.

Fresno State's Ancel Robinson tied the world record of 22.2 in the 220-yard low hurdles, a mark set by Duke's Dave Sime in 1956.

Delany Wins

Villanova's Ron Delany won the mile in 4:06.5 and came back 40 minutes later to try the 880. He finished second, some five yards behind the barreling Bowden.

Villanova won the meet with 47 points to second-place California's 32. Fresno State was third with 23 followed by Kansas, 22½; Stanford, 21; Abilene Christian, 20, and Occidental and North Carolina College, 16.

The meet's only double winner was Abilene Christian's Bobby Morrow, who won the 100 in 9.4 tonight, after equaling the world record of 9.3 in yesterday's qualifying. The Olympic champion then came back to take the 220 in 21.

Eight Records

Eight new meet records were set, six of them tonight. The marks were:

A 248ft. 1in. javelin throw by John Fromm of Pacific Lutheran; a 13.6 effort in the 120 high hurdles by Lee Calhoun of North Carolina College; an 8:57.2 two-mile by Iowa's Charles Jones, and the aforementioned marks in the pole vault, 880 and low hurdles. Morrow's 9.3 100 and the 26ft. 7in. broad jump of Indiana's Greg Bell, both hung up in yesterday's qualifying, were the other new standards.

Fromm had barely qualified in the preliminaries yesterday at 213ft. 11½in. On his first throw tonight he not only bettered the NCAA record of 246ft. 1in.; set by Kansas' Les Bitner in 1955, but he wiped out the national collegiate record of 246ft. 9in. established by Bob Voiles of Southern California this year.

There was a wind of 3 m.p.h. when Robinson soared down the aisle of low barriers.
