

# 40,046 See Davis Win Double

Bobby Morrow, Glenn Davis, Don Bragg and Texas' baton passers provided the top thrills for 40,046 watchers at the 19th annual Coliseum Relays last night.

Morrow, former Abilene Christian speedster competing unattached, turned the tables on San Jose State's Ray Norton by capturing the 100-yard dash with almost a foot to spare. Both were clocked in 9.6 for a meet grass course record.

Norton trimmed Morrow here last year and edged him last Saturday night in the West Coast Relays at Fresno. But the 1956 Olympic Games triple gold medal winner got in several good workouts during the week and pulled ahead about at the 60-yard mark.

## Two for Glenn

Davis scored a double.

First, the former Ohio star captured the 440 dash, for which he owns the world record, in 46.5. Then he came back to take the 440 hurdles in 52.1. That first clocking tied the meet record and bettered the grass mark of 47.3. His timber-topping performance broke the relays standard.

Bragg cleared 15ft. 4½in. in the pole vault and with the customers pulling hard, attempted to soar 15-9, which would have shattered the world outdoor record of 15ft. 8¼in. held by Bob Gutowski, who took second place last night. But it was no soap for the muscular Army man.

Texas U. bagged the 440 and 880 relays, but had to settle for second in the mile event—despite a sizzling 45.7 anchor lap by Eddie Southern. It wasn't enough to catch Villanova.

## Meet Marks Fall

Perfect weather, warm and virtually windless, helped make it a colorful occasion.

No world or American performances materialized, but four over-all meet marks fell, two grass records were bettered, two others were equaled and two established for new events.

Two of the meet marks also were new Coliseum records—the vault and the 440 hurdles.

The shot-put duel between SC freshman Dallas Long and Lt. Bill Nieder of the Army, which gave promise of producing an all-time distance, didn't last long. Weakened by an attack of flu, the 18-year-old collegian

called it quits after doing 60ft. 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. in the preliminaries.

Nieder went on to win with a thrust of 62ft. 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ in.

The "Miracle Mile" went to Lt. Bill Dellinger of the Air Force in 4:07.5 as he cut down Jerome Walters of the Striders near the finish. Dellinger tried for a double in the two-mile, but dropped out.

Two of the tightest races of the evening came in the 440 hurdles and the 880 run.

Josh Culbreath of the Philadelphia PAC barely missed catching Davis in the barrier event as both were clocked the same. And in the 880, Tom Murphy of the New York Athletic Club staged a tremendous stretch drive, only to fail by the proverbial whisker of overtaking Illinois' George Kerr. They both finished in 1:49.4.

### Low Jump Ceiling

SC's Charlie Dumas, fresh from clearing 7ft. at Fresno last week, needed only a 6ft. 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. spring to win last night—and that's all the altitude he could gain.

Gutowski matched Bragg up to and including 15ft.  $\frac{1}{2}$ in., but that 15-4 $\frac{1}{2}$  was a bit too rich for his blood. The former Occidental vaulter wasn't in top shape because of a recent injury.

Lee Calhoun of North Carolina College, who scratched from the meet early in the week but then changed his mind, proceeded to win the high hurdles in 13.9. Hayes Jones of Eastern Michigan took second, while the favored Elias Gilbert of Winston-Salem, who set a grass record of 13.9 last year, was relegated to third.

Max Truex, with American record-holder Alex Henderson absent because of illness, ran an 8:49.5 two-miler.

### Longhorns Fly

The Texas combine of Wally Wilson, Hollis Gainey, Ralph Alspaugh and the aforementioned Mr. Southern clipped off the 440 relay in 40.8 and the 880 in 1:24.7, each time with San Jose State, Abilene Christian and Occidental trailing in that order.

But Villanova's 3:10.4 in the mile was just three-tenths too fast for the Lone Star stagers. The other baton event, the two-mile, went to Stanford. Texas wasn't entered.
