

Trojans Romp to Easy Track Title in Final Coast Conference Meet

SEATTLE, May 23 (AP) — Scoring in all but four events, the Trojans of Southern California romped to their 18th track and field championship this afternoon as the Pacific Coast Conference closed its books on cinder competition.

The 44-year-old conference will be dissolved tomorrow by mutual consent of the nine members.

A couple of the members—UCLA and Oregon—tried to object to Southern Cal's long dominance of the cinder sport today but UCLA started too late and Oregon faded after making an early effort to keep pace with Troy.

The Trojans scored 54 points, UCLA 37½, Oregon 35. Trailing were Washington with 30, California 27½, Washington State 24, Stanford 17½, Oregon State 9 5/6 and Idaho 5. The crowd was estimated at 6,500.

One meet record was broken and three were tied—and Willie White of California figured in three of the four events. He chased Roscoe Cook of Oregon to record-matching performances in the 100-yard dash and 220, in each case losing the title he won a year ago.

Then Willie chalked up a new mark for the low hurdles, stepping over 220 yards

of sticks in 23 seconds to dethrone defending champion Spike Arlt of Washington State. He beat by a tenth of a second the record set nine years ago by Dick Attlesley of Southern California.

Cook scooted the 100 in 9.5 and the 220 in 21 flat to earn a share of the records held by three predecessors in each event. Another Oregonian, tall Otis Davis, ambled the two turns of the 440 in 46.4 and tied the meet standard set by Gordon Klemmer of California back in 1941.

Confusion struck in the day's final event—the mile

 relay—when California's Jerry Siebert dropped the baton 40 yards from the finish of the third lap. He pulled up in disgust. Jack Yerman, anchor man for the team, ran his lap anyway and finished elbow-to-elbow with Washington's Terry Tobacco.

Washington was timed in 3:14.2 but the second-place timers clocked Yerman instead of Bob Shankland of SC, who finished second. The mixup left both SC and fifth-place UCLA untimed.

Another mishap cost Oregon points when Dick Miller, leading the three-milers into the stretch, stumbled and nearly fell. He finished third behind Frank Wyatt of Idaho and Alan Gaylord of California.

Grasshoppers

No meet records were bettered in the field events, but four broad jumpers beat the Washington Stadium mark of 24ft. 9in., set in 1949 by Henry Aihara of SC. Jim Johnson of UCLA and Darrell Horn of OSC tied for first at 24ft. 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. and Johnny Kelly of Stanford and Luther Hayes of SC deadlocked for third a quar-

ter-inch short of the winning distance.

White was high-point man with 13. In addition to Cook's double in the sprints, Charlie Dumas of SC had a pair of firsts but shared one—the high jump—with teammate Bob Avant. He also won the high hurdles.
