

# Dumas Leaps 7ft.; Norton Runs 9.3

FRESNO, May 9—SC's Charlie Dumas, only American ever to high-jump 7ft. outdoors, returned to that stratospheric realm here tonight to give 15,000 West Coast relays fans their top thrill of the show.

Dumas cleared the bar at 7ft. even, failed twice at 7ft. 1½in. as he sought to better the worlds' record, then called it quits.

## 1956 Jump

As it was, he broke his own national collegiate mark of 6ft. 11½in. and the meet mark of 6ft. 10in. he shared with Ernie Shelton, the former Trojan.

Dumas first reached the magical height in 1956, when he did 7ft. ½in. in the Olympic Games trials at the Coliseum. That was it until Russia's Yuri Stepanov jumped 7ft. 1.2in. in 1957.

Sharing honors with the

Trojan ace was Ray Norton of San Jose State, who equaled the world's 100 record of 9.3 he shades with six others in capturing his heat tonight. He was favored by a 3.6 m.p.h. tailwind, not enough to "scratch" the performance, however.

Bobby Morrow, triple gold medal winner in the 1956 Olympics, won his heat in 9.4, but bowed to Norton by a whisker in the finals. The winning time was 9.4, all hands slightly having lost their edge after four false starts.

## Coasted to 9.3

It was Norton's second victory over Morrow in five meetings.

It should be added that Norton actually coasted the final few yards in his 9.3 trip, with one watch catch-

ing him at 9.2. Morrow pressed him to the limit in the finals, though. They ran as a team most of the way and the announcement of a tie would have caused no surprise in the stands.

The Southern California Striders, 1958 National AAU champions, topped the open scoring with 45 points to SC's 40%. But the 1958 NCAA champions finished first in intercollegiate scoring with 51 points to Occidental's 44.

Perfect weather made for prime performances. For example:

Adhemar Da Silva of Brazil broke the American record for the hop-step-jump when he covered 52ft. 4in. The old mark was 52ft. 1 in., by Willis Sharpe in the '56 Olympics.

### Truex Wins

Max Truex of the Striders ran the fastest 5,000 meters in the world this year—14:17—but failed to crack either his American or Fresno record.

The Bakersfield quartet of Earl Harlan, Fred Morriss, Leland Sheppard and Neville Shaw set a new national junior college mark in the distance medley relay with a clocking of 10:09.8. Second-place Santa Ana also finished under the old time of 10:14.9.

Stanford set a new meet record of 7:25.4 in the two-mile relay, with SC also bettering the former mark of 7:29.9 with its 7:28.8.

### 50.8 in Hurdles

Dick Howard of New Mexico U. skimmed the 400-meter hurdles course in 50.8 to break an 11-year-old mark owned by Roy Cochran.

And so it went. An upset almost materialized in the shot-put as Dallas Long, SC's mighty freshman, stepped up for his last try trailing Bill Nieder. But Dallas was up to the task, getting off a thrust of 62ft. 5 1/4 in. to win.
