

Kansas Wins NCAA; SC 2nd as 10 Marks Fall

BERKELEY, June 18—Kansas retained its NCAA track and field championship here this afternoon by scoring 50 points.

The star-studded Jay-

hawkers racked up four firsts — Charlie Tidwell in the 100-meter and 200-meter dashes, Bill Alley in the javelin and Cliff Cushman in the 400-meter hurdles.

SC, left for dead after yesterday's preliminaries, rallied today and captured runner-up honors with 37 points. West Coast teams also finished third, fourth and fifth as UCLA bagged 31 points, Oregon and Oregon State 22 each.

Records Tumble

Nine meet records fell today and another was equaled twice—and one of those performances also shattered a national intercollegiate standard. In addition, a new shot-put mark was set yesterday by Troy's big Dallas Long.

SC's Luther Hayes, who couldn't even qualify in the broad jump yesterday, about-faced today and got

his name in the record book with a hop-step-jump of 50ft. 11½in.

Jim Johnson of UCLA came through with a winning performance in the 110-meter hurdles. Rafer's little brother traveled the course in 14s. flat, which was no record but helped mightily as the Bruins made a surprisingly strong showing.

Cunliffe Upset

The big race of the day, as anticipated, was the 800-meters.

set all the pace, only to falter in the stretch and finish third as George Kerr of Illinois won in 1:46.4, fastest clocking in the world this year and a new intercollegiate record.

Jerry Siebert of California took second with 1:46.9, his best ever, while Conliffe was clocked in 1:47.6. Kerr, who will compete for the West Indies in the forthcoming Olympic Games, bettered the 1:46.7 of Pittsburgh's Arnie Sowell made in 1956. This also was the meet record.

The 10.2 mark for 100 meters was tied in a semifinal heat by Paul Winder of Morgan State and again by Tidwell in the finals as he lunged into the tape a narrow victor over Winder.

Long was unable to improve his 61ft. 9in. shot-put of yesterday, but has two years to shoot at himself, as it were.

Thomas Clears 7ft.

Thomas, after clearing 7ft. for the 28th time, had the bar upped to 7-2. But he failed in three tries at a new world record. He already has a 7-1 $\frac{3}{4}$ performance pending for recognition.

Bob Holland and Mil Dahl of the Bruins did a terrific job in the 1500, taking second and third behind the incomparable Burleson. Holland was timed at 3:47.5 and Dahl at 3:47.9.

What's more, Paul Welborn of Occidental finished fourth in 3:48.7, as such stalwart performers as Bill Dotson, George Larson, Gary Weisger, Ergas Leps and Boris Almond trailed.

The 400 was a lulu. Cali-

fornia's Jack Yerman did 46.8—and finished sixth.

Ahead of him were Woods, Vic Hall of Cal Poly, Walt Johnson of North Carolina College, Dave Myers of Central Michigan and Dick Edmunds of Princeton in times ranging from 45.7 to 46.5. It must have been the fastest cavalry charge of all time.

Adding to the many Trojan disappointments this weekend, Charlie Dumas could do no better than 6ft. 8in., and that height got him only a third-place tie.

The first six American finishers in each event qualified for the final Olympic trials, which will be staged at Stanford, July 1-2.
