Johnson Runs 9.2 Wind-Aided 100

BY AL WOLF Things really popped at the Mt. San Antonio Relays Saturday afternoon.

Picking up where the United States Olympic team left off last summer with its final Pre-Games record spree, Saturday's field of university and club performers came through with a flock of superlative performances before 10,000 fans.

Dennis Johnson, Jamaica's gift to San Jose State,

ran the 100 in 9.2, onetenth better than the world's record, only to have his clocking nullified by an 11.2 m.p.h. tailwind.

Jay Silvester, former Utah State athlete now competing for Santa Clara Valley Youth Village, accomplished the greatest weight dcuble in track history.

He put the shot 61ft. 1³/₄in., then wafted the discus 192ft. 5¹/₂in.

Bob Avant of SC became

the first high jumper to do seven feet outdoors this year, clearing precisely that height for the first time in his life to join John Thomas, Charley Dumas and Joe Faust as the only Americans to gain such altitude without the benefit of a pole or propeller.

The Trojans' mile relay combine of Bobby Staten, Dean Balzarett, Kevin Hogan and Rex Cawley set a national collegiate record of 3:07.6.

Earlier this season the same foursome and Abilene Christian did 3:07.9. Avant was voted the field athlete of the Mt. SAC show, while track honors went to Cawley, who also captured the 400 meter hurdles in 50:6, fastest time in the country this year, and ran on the 880 baton team which broke the meet record with a 1:23.6 trick.

Cawley's performance in the mile relay was phe-

nomenal. He got a bad pass from Hogan that left him about six yards behind Arizona State's Mal Spence on the anchor lap. The Trojan sophomore proceded to rip off a 45.4 and won by a stride.

Steve Haas of Occidental ripped off a 20.3 furlong as the Tigers set a meet record of 3:22 in the sprint medley relav.

Bruce Kidd, the 17-yearold distance marvel from Toronto, had no competition in the 5,000 meter run and loafed to a disappointing (but first place) 14:46.8.
