

Long Sets New NCAA Shot Record of 62-9

PHILADELPHIA — Two records fell as the 40th annual National Collegiate track championship swept through the opening day at Franklin Field Friday under California type weather conditions.

Dallas Long of Southern California bettered his own shot put record with a toss of 62ft. 9¼in. to lead the qualifiers in this event after Pat Clohessy of Houston had won the three-mile grind in 13:47.7.

The distance test, the only final of the opening day's competition, saw the first four finishers better the old mark of 13:59.1, set two years ago by Paul Whiteley of Emporia (Kan.) State.

Qualifying went pretty much as expected so far as the team championship was concerned, but the big upset of the afternoon came in the semi-finals of the half

mile when Andy Dunkell, highly regarded UCLA runner, dropped out with 300 yards to go, after winning his heat in the first round in 1:52.7.

Dixon Farmer of Occidental gave strong indication he may be the class of the 440-

yd. hurdlers when he turned in a best time of 51.4s. to lead the way into the finals today.

Earl Young, the former San Fernando youth competing for Abilene Christian, made the quarter mile flat race look easy as he coasted to a 46.6s. victory in his heat of the semis.

Dyrol Burleson of Oregon, who passed the 850, coasted to a 4:09.8 victory in the mile.

At day's end SC led the qualifying with 9. Oregon and Villanova had 7 places each for today's finals. UCLA was next in line with 6 while Occidental, Michigan and Harvard had four. San Jose State and Stanford qualified three.

Clark Second

Coach Bud Winter's Spartans, however, had eight points on the score board, thanks to a sterling performance by Charles Clark, the former Santa Ana prepster, who took second to the Australian, Clohessy, in the three mile.

Clark stayed right with the 26-year-old veteran from Houston until the last 300 yards as he was clocked in 13:51.6, yards ahead of the rest.

While the highly favored Trojans had only one more qualifier than Villanova and Oregon, their top contenders for the title, they pick up strong potential point-makers in the pole vault and high jump, for which there were no trials.

As expected, Villanova made an impressive splash in the sprints. Frank Beck tied the best mark ever for Franklin Field when he set the pace among the 100-yd. men with a figure of 9.5.

He also had a 21s. flat for the furlong semi-finals, but Paul Drayton, his teammate, stole the show there, with a 23.0. performance.

Oregon Strong Points

Oregon's expected strength showed in the mile, 100, half, and high hurdles. The Webfoots qualified three in the mile; Harry Jerome and Roscoe Cook in the hundred, and Jerry Tarr in the high hurdles where he earned the best clocking at 13.9.

The Trojans were not without their disappointments. Jim Wade (158 ft.) and Long (163-7), failed to make it in the discus.

Kevin Hogan pulled up seventh and last in the quarter semi-finals; Warren Farlow did the same in his heat of the half after getting past the first round; and while Bobby Staten made it in the 440 hurdles, his time of 52.4. indicated no better than fourth today. This could be misleading, because he hit the next to last barrier, and almost fell.

Hayes in Jumps

On the brighter side, Luther Hayes stood in second place in both the broad jump and hop, step, and jump. He was only an inch and a quarter back of Winston Cooper, St. John's, who got a 50ft. 11 1/4in. effort on his last try. In the broad jump Hayes was led by three inches by Don Meyer, Colorado, who hit the broad for 25ft.

Bob Shordone stood fourth with a toss of 234ft. 9 1/4in. in the javelin, just behind Chuck Wilkinson of Redlands, who had a 240ft. 10 1/4in. throw. Dan Likens of Oregon State was the leader at 244ft. 0in.
