

# BURLESON SPARKS OREGON TO SENSATIONAL RELAYS RECORD

FRENO — The University of Oregon's Webfoots (and wotta misleading nickname that is) turned the 36th annual West Coast Relays almost into a private party here Saturday.

Operating on their own because coach Bill Bowerman elected to watch his "left-overs" win a dual meet from Washington at Seattle, the Oregonians ganged up to set a world record in the four-mile relay, and also win the 100, the mile and the 120 high hurdles.

They had planned to crack the American distance medley mark, too, and probably would have done so. But

when a chill gusty wind came up in the evening, they decided to scratch.

USC's Dallas Long, cranking up for Friday night's meeting with gargantuan Gary Gubner of New York U. at the Coliseum Relays,

put the shot 64 ft. 9½ in., his lifetime best and top effort in the world since Bill Nsedor's record 65-10 of 1960.

In the pole vault, the battle between 16 footers Dave Tork and John Uelses proved a fizzle. Both failed at 15 ft. 8 in., along with Ron Morris, Jeff Chase and George Davies leaving it a five way tie at a "measly" 15-2½.

Oregon's fantastic four—some of sophomore Archie San Romani, juniors Vic Reeve and Keith Forman and senior Dyrrol Burleson not only broke the four mile record, they pulverized it. Galloping the distance in 16:08.9, they whacked 14.9s. from the 1961 clocking of 16:23.8 by a New Zealand

team that included Murray Halberg and Peter Snell.

The performance of this school combine was all the more remarkable in that it is the first time in 25 years that the record hasn't been held by an all-star national team—Hungary before New Zealand and Australia before that.

The individual times were announced as 4:04 for San Romani and also Reeve, 4:03 for Forman and 3:57.9 for Burleson.

But other veteran timers on the premises came up with this consensus: San Romani, 4:03.5; Reeve, 4:05.2; Forman, 4:02.5, and Burleson, 3:57.7.

If the latter clockings actually were the correct ones, then San Romani, Reeve and Forman set personal records and Burleson missed his American record of 3:56.7 by just one tick. Forman came back to capture the mile in 4:00.7, Jerry Tarr took the high hurdles in 13.7 and Harry Jerome the 100 in a wind-aided 9.3.

Long, whose previous intercollegiate record measured 64-7<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>, uncorked three other good ones—64-2, 62-7 and 62-2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>. He fouled twice.

### **Fast 5,000**

Running barefooted, Dale Story of Oregon State ran the fastest 5,000-meter race in the world this year and set a new intercollegiate record in the process. The Orange athlete was timed in 14:03.5 as he defeated Charley Clark of Santa Clara Valley Youth Village by 15 yd. and shattered former Trojan Max Truex's mark of 14:04.2.

Larry Stuart of Santa Ana increased his own national junior college record to 256-2 in the javelin and went to the top of the U.S. list for 1962. Another JC mark fell when Jamaican Mahoney Samuels of Foothill hop-step-jumped 51-10<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>.
