

Long Upset; Budd Goes Lame in 100

Defending champions fell right and left in the first half of the National AAU track and field championships Friday night at Mt. San Antonio College, but the record breaking was sparse.

Top performance of the evening came in the six-mile when Bruce Kidd, fantastic 18-year-old Canadian, ran away from his field and shattered an American record as he ran the grind in 28:23.2.

This clipped 13.6 off the American record and 29.4s off the meet mark.

After Friday night's eight events, two meet marks had tumbled and one was tied. A crowd of 8,500 gave the youthful Canadian a great round of applause as he sputered far out in front with a half mile to go and increased the pace to finish by 80 yd. over Pete McArdle of the New York Athletic Club.

Long Topples

The most surprising, and tragic upset, was the failure of Frank Budd in the 100-yd. dash when he pulled a hamstring muscle halfway through the race.

The world-record holder limped off the track as Bob Hayes of Florida A&M went on to edge out Harry Jerome of Emerald Empire AA in 9.3.

Equally as stunning was the defeat of USC's Dallas Long in the shot put. Gary Gubner, the New York U. giant, won with his last toss which arched out 63 ft. 6½ in. for a new meet record.

Long, who broke the world's record in the Coliseum Relays earlier this spring, had a first toss of 63-1¼ and this stood up until Gubner's final throw.

Won Qualifier

No less an upset was turned in by NCAA champion Jerry Tarr who scored a narrow victory in the 120 high hurdles when he dethroned the defending champion, Hayes Jones of Detroit, in 13.4. This equalled the meet mark set by Jack Davis back in 1956.

Budd had appeared to be in fine fettle as he won his qualifying heat with ease in 9.3. The Villanova star, who set a world's record of 9.2 in this meet at Randall's Island a year ago, had one of his usual fast starts.

Hayes was charging at him but Budd was leading by a foot between the 50 and 60-yd. marks when he suddenly stumbled and then dropped back as the field swept by. He limped painfully off the track into the infield.

It was a sad ending to a great collegiate career and

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left the sprinter's future a question mark. Budd had been beaten by Hayes in the Coliseum Relays but was not in top shape at the time.

He came back to run at Compton where he suffered a groin injury and had only a limited amount of training from that point until he won his third straight NCAA title at Eugene, Ore., a week ago.

Boston Survives

The only defending champion to survive the evening's festivities was Ralph Boston of Nashville, Tenn., who retained his AAU crown in the broad jump with a leap of 26ft. 6in. His closest competitor was Paul Warfield of the Ohio Track Club, whose best lacked a quarter-inch of being a foot behind.

Willie Atterberry of the Los Angeles Track Club beat out Rex Cawley of the Trojans to win the 440-yd. hurdles in 50.5. Cawley was timed in 50.6, well ahead of Russ Rogers of Maryland State, who was third.

The first defending champion to be upset was John Fromm in the javelin. It was a dismal performance by all the spear throwers as Fromm finished sixth and the top three competitors in the nation this year, Glenn Winningham, Jan Sikorsky, the NCAA champion from USC, and Larry Stuart failing to qualify for the final round.

Studney Wins

The new champion was Dan Studney of Santa Clara Youth Village with a casual performance of 246 ft. 6 in. Second was Nick Kovalakides of the Marine Corps with a toss of 245 ft. 10 in.

A four-way tie broken up on a recheck on the number of misses resulted in the high jump and John Thom-

as of Boston University emerged victorious.

The tie was at 6 ft. 10 in. among Thomas, Gene Johnson of California, who was awarded second place; Bob Avant, Southern California Striders, third, and Bob Gardner, Marine Corps, fourth.

Fastest Half

John Reilly of the New York Athletic Club turned in the fastest time in the three half-mile qualifying heats for today's final when he was clocked in 1:48.2. This was 3/10th of a second faster than the winning time by Jim Dupree a year ago.

Jack Yerman of the U.S. Army, one of the top favorites, won the first heat in 1:48.7 and in the slowest heat Darnell Mitchell of the Cleveland Striders was clocked in 1:49.4.

440 Qualifiers

Ulis Williams led the qualifiers for today's 440-yd. final. The stringbean Arizona State freshman, running for the Southern California Striders, was clocked in 46.4, pulled up.

Adolph Plummer of New Mexico, the defending champion, was clocked in 46.6 as he won his heat. Ray Sadtler also won his 440 heat in 46.6.
