

Carr Runs Blazing 20.3 Around Curve for Record

TEMPE, Ariz. — Sophomore sprinter Henry Carr of Arizona State ran a scorching 20.3 to fashion the world's fastest 220-yd. dash around a curve here Saturday night in a triangular meet against USC and Arizona.

USC topped triangular scoring with 81½ points to Arizona State's 62 and Arizona's 37½. The Trojans also won both dual meets, whipping A-State, 82-63, and Arizona, 99-46.

It was the second time within a week Carr lowered the listed world mark of 20.5 in the event, having clocked

20.4 here Tuesday night in a dual meet against Utah. His 20.4 effort, however, was disallowed because the course was 18 in. short.

Conditions for his epic showing Saturday night were ideal as the 20-year-old sprinter from Detroit, running in the third lane, made up the stagger-advantage of his competitors while heading into the turn against a slight breeze of 0.3 m.p.h.

All three watches clocked Carr in 20.3, faster than the existing mark of 20.5 set by Peter Radford of Great Britain in 1960 and Paul Drayton of the United States in 1962.

Carr's performance also better's the world record for 200 meters around a turn, the mark owned jointly by Drayton and Radford, along with Stone Johnson and Ray Norton of the U.S. and Livio Berutti of Italy.

Afterward, Carr said he felt he'd run a "smooth" race, although he was surprised at the time. "I honestly didn't feel I was going that fast," he said. "I'm not going to stop here. I'm going to try to do better."

Carr, who said his goal is to qualify for the United States team which faces

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Russia this summer in Moscow, ruled out any chances of his running the 440-yd. dash. "I'll do it only in the mile relay," he said.

The 6-3, 185 lb. Negro also said he had been in training since January for his recent efforts, which also included a 20.6 clocking earlier this month against Occidental College. A reserve half-back on the Sun Devil football team, Carr passed up spring drills to concentrate on track.

Grid Injuries

Last spring he suffered an ankle injury and severely bruised ribs in football practice.

Asked if anyone was pushing him Saturday, Carr replied:

"Everyone was in front of me out of those blocks. If I can improve my starts, I just might go a little faster.

A capacity crowd of 8,000 fans at Goodwin Stadium watched Carr finish 10 yd. ahead of USC's Dick Cortese, whose second place 20.8 was the fastest 220 clocking in Troy history. Because he finished runner-up, Cortese's mark was not a school record.

In addition to his historic showing in the 220, Carr won the 100-yd. dash in 9.5, with Cortese placing second, was runner-up in the broad jump at 23-9 and ran a 46.0 leg on the Sun Devil's winning mile relay effort of 3:07.2—the swiftest time in the event this season.

The Trojans' mile relay team failed to finish when leadoff runner Ted Doll pulled a muscle.

Carr's next appearance in the Southland will be April 22 at the Mt. San Antonio Relays.
