

USC'S MARIN WINS NCAA 6-MILE RUN

ALBUQUERQUE — Diminutive Julio Marin, 21-year-old Costa Rica distance star wearing the cardinal and gold of Southern California, sent the Trojans off into the lead in the NCAA track and field championships Thursday night when he ran away from the field in the 6-mile grind.

His time of 30:32.9 will stand as a meet record since this is the first time for the event in this national collegiate classic.

26-7 Broad Jump

The victory in the only final event of the cool evening in this mile high altitude—which didn't seem to bother the 121-lb. Trojan—gave USC a big 10 points while its arch rival, defending cham-

pion Oregon, had to be content with two.

One meet record was tied during this, the first of three days of competition. It came when Clifton Mayfield of Central State (Ohio) cleared 26 ft. 7 in. in the broad jump but it was wind aided and will not count.

Marin, the 121-lb. Trojan, took the lead after four and one half miles in the 6-mile grind and steadily increased his advantage to 50 yd. as he jogged into the tape. He runs the 3-miles today.

Jeff Fishback of San Jose State was second, timed in 30:36.2; followed by Vic Zwolak, Villanova, in third. Ireland Sloan of Emporia State, the early leader, finished a far behind fourth and Clayton Steinke of Oregon was fifth to give the Webfoots 2 points.

The Trojans and Webfoots, as co-favorites, did not come out of the first night's preliminaries unscathed.

Coach Bill Bowerman's Ducks lost their star, Mel Renfro, when he pulled up lame in the broad jump qualifying and then limped out of the money in his flight on the high hurdles.

By the same token Kevin Hogan, Troy's 880-yd. hope who has been handicapped by a recent illness, failed to qualify in this event and so did Bob Pierce, USC's No. 2 high hurdler who has had a crippling sore toe.

Troy Sets Pace

Coach Vern Wolfe's team set the pace through the first night of the three-day meet preliminaries with 11 places compared with half a dozen for Oregon.

Gentile Almost Punches Scribe

Tender Knee

Renfro, who had come here with a tender left knee, crumpled after his second broad jump attempt, limped to the training quarters, and after an examination, withdrew from the event.

He was a stumbling sixth in his high hurdles heat, two places short of qualifying. Renfro had been counted on strongly in these events. He took a second and third in them a year ago for 14 points.

Farmer Out

Another upset came in the third heat of the 440-yd. hurdles when Dixon Farmer of Occidental ran fifth and out after his teammate, Ron Whitney, had qualified for the semifinals in 52.1.

Southern California's sprinters, Dave Morris and Dick Cortese, accounted for four places in the two sprints; Rex Cawley two by easing into the semifinals in the quarter and 440-yd. hurdles; pole vault spots for Mel Hein Jr., and Mike Flanagan; the high jump where Lew Hoyt and George Fleckenstein made the grade; and then got a spot in the high hurdles through the efforts of Brian Polkinghorne.
