

# Marin's 'Double' Gives USC Lead

## Trojan Wins NCAA 3-Mile, but Others Falter; Meet Ends Today

ALBUQUERQUE — Southern California's "mighty midget," 5-ft. 7-in. Julio Marin, accomplished the most remarkable double in the history of the NCAA track and field championships Friday night on the mile-high University Stadium course here.

After running away with the 6-mile Thursday night, the 21-year-old Trojan medical student added a 3-mile victory to give coach Vern Wolfe's team 20 points and the lead in the meet that concludes tonight.

Marin, running away from his field with a half-mile to go, built up a 50-yd. lead, and while all but 10 yd. of it vanished when Vick Reeve of Oregon ran at him in the last 220, he had obvious control as he crossed the finish line in 14:24.9.

### Steeplechase Next

His 6-mile time Thursday night was 30:32 as he won by 50 yd.

If there's enough left of him, the diminutive Trojan will have another go at it in the 3,000-meter steeplechase tonight.

With the major share of the finals on tap tonight, USC's lead over such rivals as Oregon, defending title holder, Arizona State, Villanova and Stanford looked precarious despite the great performance of Marin.

Southern California has eight qualifiers; Oregon

seven, Stanford 6, and Arizona State five.

With four championships decided, Villanova was second to the Trojans with 12 points. Oregon and Boston College had 10 each and San Jose State a surprising nine.

Julio was spurred on by the cheers of the strongly populated Spanish-American crowd yelling at him in his native tongue.

### Blister Problem

In addition to the draining effect of the altitude here, Marin had incurred some blisters from his 6-mile race of the night before and scored his victory over fresh athletes who had not run in the longer race Thursday night.

He stayed with the pace all the way until the last half mile, when he broke away from third place with a spurt that quickly left his opposition far behind.

Not until Reeve of Oregon suddenly awoke on the back stretch of the final lap, did it

look like anyone could finish close. The Webfoot runner obviously didn't properly pace his race, but it is doubtful if he ever would have caught Marin, who had plenty left.

The other two finals of the second night of the meet came in the broad jump and hammer throw.

Clifton Mayfield of Central (Ohio) State, was victorious with a best leap of 26 ft. 7 in., made in Thursday night's qualifying.

In the hammer, George Desnoyers of Boston College

took the all-Eastern event with a fling of 190 ft. 2 in.

Southern California's qualifying woes began in the javelin where Larry Stuart, pre-meet favorite, fouled twice and then had a best of 232 ft. 5½ in., far out of the money, as Frank Covelli, Arizona State, set the pace to become the favorite today with a 257 ft. 8½ in. mark.

### Lone Survivor

They didn't improve when Dave Morris was the lone USC survivor in the sprints and this only in the 100-yd. dash. Carr gave Arizona State an expected boost in these semi-finals as he won both his 100 and 220-yd. heats in fine fashion. A sharp battle between Carr and Nate Adams of Purdue is on tap today.

Oregon, meantime, was strengthening its position in defense of its title. The Webfoots placed a man in both the javelin and 100, and assumed the favorite's role in the shot put.

In the 16-lb. weight toss Dave Steen took the lead with a flip of 61 ft. 11¼ in., compared with 61 ft. 9¼ for Gary Gubner of New York U. defending champion. John McGrath of Occidental had a comfortable third at 59 ft. 2½ in.

### Still Kicking

Rex Cawley and Brian Polkinghorne kept the Trojan hopes alive, after a fashion. Cawley had the fastest time in the quarter-mile dash at 46 flat and ran third in the 440-yd. hurdles to qualify for both finals today. His hurdle time was 51.5.

C. K. Yang, UCLA's deca-

thlon star, had the fastest mark in the high barrier semifinals, winning his heat in 13.9. Polkinghorne was a close second to Charles Moseley, Alabama, in the second heat, with each clocked in 14 flat.

Occidental made its presence felt not only in the shot but also in the half mile, where Steve Haas was a strong qualifier in 1:51.9, and the 440-yd. hurdles with Ron Whitney running 51 flat for the second in his heat.

Stanford's Dave Weill got himself a big bulge in the discus trials with a best throw of 181 ft. 2½ in. The Indians also qualified two men in the sprints, another in the mile, and Steve Cortright will be on hand in both the high hurdles and triple jump.
