

Carr Nips Hayes in 200 Race

Villanova's great 3-mile relay team, spearheading an all-out record assault in the 24th Coliseum Relays, tied the world's record of 7:19 before a shivering crowd of 25,713 spectators at Memorial Coliseum Friday night.

The classic featured a host of sterling performances which saw Henry Carr of Arizona State University defeat Bob Hayes of Florida A&M by a long yard to capture the sprint feature — the 200-meter dash — in the Relays record tying time of 20.3 sec.

Carr, world record holder at 20.3 sec., passed Hayes, the best 100-yd. sprinter extant, with 50 yd. to go. The Florida speedster was clocked in 20.8.

Seven Records

In addition to the world and American record tied in the 3-mile relay, Ronald Laird from Pomona but representing the New York AC, posted a United States mark of 5:57.0 in the 1500-meter walk.

A total of seven Coliseum Relays records were broken and another tied during the hot competition on a cold night.

From a team point of view, it was a great night for Little Grambling College of Louisiana.

Vernon Hagsdale, a prep star at San Diego, captured the 100-yd. dash in 9.8 sec. Then Richard Stebbins, formerly of Fremont High in Los Angeles, beat Carr by a foot in the 100-meters. His time was 10.2.

Grambling Repeats

They came off these sterling races to combine with two former Compton prepsters, Don Meadows and Don Owens, to capture the two sprint relays.

The Grambling speedsters were clocked in 40.2 for the 40-yd. baton test and 1:23.8 for the 800.

Bill Hallie, New Zealand's great distance star, ran away with the 5000 meters as expected in meet record time of 13:54.4.

The triple jump event brought forth another meet mark when Darrell Horn of the Air Force cleared 52 ft. 4 3/4 in.

High Jump Upset

The field events produced one upset, while contributing two Relays records to the cause.

John Rambo of California State at Long Beach captured the high jump on the basis of no misses as three cleared 6 ft. 10 in. but failed at 6-11.

Second was Charles Dumas of the Striders, 1956 Olympic champion, who failed once on the way. John Thomas of Boston, the favorite, was thus relegated to third.

Long Triumphs

Dallas Long captured the shot put with a best toss of 45 ft. 5 1/4 in., as he defeated giant Randy Matson, Texas A. & M. freshman, who fouled three times but still took second with a 43 5 3/4 effort.

Hal Connolly, just returned from Finland, was an easy victor in the hammer throw with a toss of 218 ft. 8 in., two feet better than his performance in Europe a week ago.

Ralph Boston of the Striders leaped 28 ft. to take the long jump; Rink Babbs of the Pasadena AA flipped the discus 155 ft. 10 1/2; and his teammate Frank Covell,

took the javelin at 261 ft. 11 in., his best effort this year.

In the 2-mile relay, Noel Carroll, of Ireland, running anchor, was clocked in 1:46.8 as he barely edged out San Jose State's John Garrison in a gallant finish, with UCLA third and Texas fourth.

San Jose's quartet had held the lead from the first baton pass on into the stretch run when Carroll put on his great spurt to take over. The California team was timed in 7:19.6.

Villanova tied the mark posted last year by Oregon State at Modesto.

Cawley Returns

Rex Cawley of the Pasadena A.A., who has been inactive this outdoor season with a leg injury, made a sparkling return to competition by winning the 400-meter hurdles in 51 sec. flat, in a tight finish with Willie Atterberry of the Striders.

The Miracle Mile, usually a feature of this meet, resulted in an upset victory for John Camien of Emporia State Teachers when he defeated Pan-American victor Jim Grelle of the L.A. Track Club by four yd. in the time of 4 min. 1.4 sec. as he came from behind on the turn and edged steadily ahead.

Norm Hoffman of the Oregon State Track Club figured in the relay record breaking when he took the 800-meter run in 1:47.1. Ollan Cassell of Houston won the 400-meter dash in 46.1 sec.

Along toward morning Mel Hein of the Striders was declared winner of the pole vault with the fewest misses among the three who cleared a relays record height of 16ft. 1in., with C. K. Yang second and Ron Morris third.
