## Loss Among

## Its Worst

ALBUQUERQUE — Freshman and sophomore-studded New Mexico soared to glittering heights in collegiate track-and-field Saturday by smothering Southern California, 98½-46½, in a dual meet that wasn't supposed to be nearly so lopsided.

A crowd of about 6,000 watched the power-packed Lobos unleash one of the most severe beatings a USC track team ever has absorbed by scoring 13 first places and establishing five school records.

It was Troy's first dual meet setback since 1962, as well as the second such defeat in 20 years—a span embracing 124 dual meets—for the Trojans, who have yielded a greater number of points only twice previously.

### One-Sided Losses

In 1908, Troy was walloped by Stanford, 104-18, and, in 1921, California romped to a 105-26 victory over the Trojans. USC, a perennial power in track, has lost only four dual meets in 32 years — to California (1943), to Caltech (1945), to Oregon (1962) and now, New Mexico.

Adding insult to injury, New Mexico defeated coach Vern Wolfe's Trojans in their specialties, the distance races. Two Lobo freshmen—Pat Cox in the 880 and Web Loudat in the two-mile—scored upset victories, clocking 1:54.2 and 9:28.8, respectively.

### Double Win

Art Carter, a junior, whizzed to a pair of victories for New Mexico, winning the 440 and 220-yard dashes, and then staying off USC's Dave Buck on the anchor lap to give the Lobos a triumph in the mile relay.

USC won only three events—the pole vault, shot put and triple jump. In distance events, the Trojans appeared to be hampered by Albuquerque's 5,000-foot altitude, but the outcome never hinged on these events.

Outstanding in a losing cause was Wellesley Clayton, who posted a long jump mark of 26 feet.

### Wind Aided

New Mexico's Fred Knight picked up two firsts in the high hurdles and 330-yard hurdles. He whipped off the high hurdles in 13.9 seconds, but the 10-m.p.h. wind disallowed his bid for a new school record.

Larry Kennedy of the Lobos put the shot 58 feet 10 inches for a school record, but it was only good enough for second place in the event.

Southern Cal's Jeff Smith tossed the shot 59 feet 3/4 inch.

Another New Mexico record was set by Frank Burgasser who threw the javelin 245 feet 9 1/2 inches, more than a foot farther than the old mark. The wind helped sprinter Bernie Rivers to a 9.3 second time in the 100-yard dash.

In the 880, Cox pulled a surprise in an event in which Southern Cal had been heavily favored. He finished more than a second ahead of Bruce Bess.
