

# Gerry Wins 2-Mile in 8:38.9; Randy Heaves Shot 67-11

The smallest fellow in the meet shoved the biggest one out of the spotlight at the Silver Anniversary Coliseum Relays Friday night.

Tiny Gerry Lindgren, 18-year-old Washington State freshman, lowered his national frosh 2-mile record from 8:40.2 to 8:38.9—and shattered the meet mark in the process.

And that performance got him a bigger hand than that accorded huge Randy Matson, Texas A&M sophomore who did "only" 67 feet 11 inches in the shot-put after achieving an incredible 70-7 last week.

No other human ever shoved the 16-pound ball that far, but the 18,451 customers obviously expected more.

## Has Trouble

Matson complained that the missile was slipping off his fingers — and he also must have felt a bit chilly despite the balmy weather, because he donned a T-shirt for his final put.

Randy also got credit for a meet mark, and those were the only two of the show, though Villanova's 2-mile relay team equalled its 7:19.0 of 1964, which at that time tied the world record. But Oklahoma State uncorked a 7:18.4 last week.

Matson, by the way, also captured the discus throw with 186-5½, a distance considerably off the national intercollegiate record of 199-7½ he established a week ago.

## Questad Wins

San Jose State's Mike Gibeau ran the fastest 880 in the country this year—1:48.7 — and Stanford's Larry Questad roared from behind to beat UCLA freshman Norm Jackson and Fresno Stater Darel Newman in the 100 at 9.5.

Otherwise, it was a rather quiet evening afield as well

as at the box-office (the attendance was the lowest since 1946).

Questad pulled a thigh muscle at the finish of the 100, so coach Payton Jordan scratched the Indians from the 440 relay, an event in which they set a world record of 39.7 last week.

Clarence Robinson of New Mexico, the nation's No. 1 long jumper, stayed home because of an injury and the Texas Southern squad, including such standout performers as Roy Hicks, Ray Saddler, Jim Hines and Clyde Duncan, failed to show up.

Matson smashed the meet record on his very first put, which measured 67-3½, as compared to 65-10½ by Dallas Long in 1962. After a 63-4¾ slip, Randy came back with the 67-11 that erased the Coliseum record and listed world record of 67-10 by Long a year ago.

After fouling, Matson finished with 63-11 1/4 and 63-9 3/4.

## Torrid 2-Mile

The 2-mile baton race was torrid, with UCLA and USC pressing Villanova all the way. The Bruins' Bob Day made a bid on the anchor lap, coming up to run on almost even terms with Noel Carroll. But the latter pulled away in the stretch — and Troy's Dennis Carr passed Day for second place.

USC was timed in 7:19.4 and UCLA in 7:20.8.

Incidentally, the Villanova foursome was precisely the same that made exactly the same clocking last year—Al Adams, Jim Orr, Tommy Sullivan and Carroll.

Ulis Williams, the 440 favorite, got a scare when UCLA freshman Don Domansky tore out in an attempt to steal the race. But the Arizona State veteran put on the gas, nailed the yearling at the turn for home and won with ease as Domansky faded to fourth.

Paul Wilson of Warren High in Downey, whose early-season vault of 16-6 3/4 still rates as the best in the world this year, could clear

only 15-6 in the special prep competition. He had three misses at 16-2.

It was a different story in the open vault, where Mike Graves of Occidental, Bill Fosdick of USC and Marc Savage, competing unattached from UCLA, all did 16-0. Savage was the winner because of fewer misses.
