

USC, DUCKS SHARE NCAA TRACK LEAD

BERKELEY — Southern California and defending champion Oregon were tied with 20 points each Friday after the second day of the NCAA track and field championships at Edwards Field.

Sixteen of the Trojans' total came in the high hurdles when Paul Kerry won in 13.9 with a powerful lunge at the tape to edge out Gerry Cerulla of Utah State, with Theo Viltz of USC finishing third.

The Webfoots chalked up two victories Friday for their score of digits in a meet that, up to this point, has resulted in only one collegiate record.

Shot Put Winner

Oregon's Neal Steinhauer started things off for the 1964 champions when he won the shot put with a toss of 62 feet, 6 inches.

Then Bruce Mortenson, a

21-year-old junior, came on to capture the steeplechase in 9:00.8, as he ran away from Ray Barrus of Brigham Young and Earl Clibborn of UCLA on the last two laps. Clibborn missed second when he fell at the last barrier.

Charlie Greene put Nebraska into contention for the team title (16 points) as he sped to a two-foot victory with a time of 9.4 in a race that saw Stanford's Larry Questad pull up lame and finish sixth.

N.C. College Ace

The race was marred by three false starts, two of them by Ed Roberts of North Carolina College, one of the top favorites, who was thereby eliminated from the race.

Darel Newman of Fresno State took second with a time of 9.5, which was the same figure given Lynn Headley of Nebraska and Bernie Rivers of New Mexico for third and fourth, respectively.

Questad's failure to figure strongly in the 100 and his injury undoubtedly eliminated Stanford as a threat for the team title.

New Mexico, San Jose State and California still are

threats to the leaders in the team championships today, with Southern California and Oregon depending largely on their field event contenders.

The best race of the day was the 120-yard high hurdles.

Troy's Viltz got away from the marks fast for the early lead, but Cerulla caught and passed him at the half-way mark.

Kerry put on a terrific finish. A half stride behind Cerulla on the final barrier he made a powerful lunge at the tape to win by inches and keep USC's cause alive.

Wellesley Clayton's failure in the long jump when he finished fourth with a leap of 24-7, and Jeff Smith's drop down to seventh in the shot with a best effort of 58-1/4 hurt the Trojan cause.

Critical Events

Big points in the pole vault by Bill Fosdick, the high jump by Lew Hoyt, and the discus by Gary Carlsen are needed today for a Trojan victory.

As it stands, coach Vern Wolfe's team has representation only in the three mile of today's track finals, while Oregon has contenders in both the half and the distance race.
