

USC, Oregon Tie for NCAA Track Crown

BERKELEY — USC and Oregon tied for the NCAA track and field championship here Saturday but diminutive Doug Brown of Montana stole the show.

It took the final event of the afternoon, the mile relay, to decide the team title as the Webfoot baton quartet finished fourth to catch up with the Trojans who already had 32 points on the board.

The crowd of 16,000 cheered wildly as the 5 foot 6 inch, 128 pound Brown came from behind to win the three mile in a photo finish over John Lawson of Kansas in

the new meet time of 13:40.2.

It came on top of his collegiate record setting 27:39.2 for the six mile Thursday evening.

As it was, the 21-year-old junior from Montana had to share double victory honors.

Clarence Robinson of New Mexico came through with a 50-2 triple jump victory after winning the long jump on Friday.

In the final analysis, however, top honors had to go to Brown, who set the only records established in this 44th annual national collegiate championship.

After trailing Lawson by 10 yards going into the last lap, Doug turned on a burst of speed rounding the final turn to take the lead. The Jayhawker inched ahead of him as they entered the stretch but Brown had a little left as he came on again to hit the tape no more than an inch in front.

Close Call

The officials had to call for the photo to separate them. Lawson also was credited with the 13:40.2 mark, which erased a four year old record of 13:47.7 posted by Pat Clohesy of Houston at Philadelphia.

Brown's double took only a little of the edge off a great mile in which UCLA's Bob Day set a fantastic first-lap pace and staggered through the final lap in 67.5 to beat Bob Delaney of Brigham Young by five yards in 4:01.8.

The Bruin star, obviously fearful of the superior kick of some of his competitors, tore out to take a 10-yard lead with a 55.3 first quarter; extended it to 25 yards with a 1:53.4 half; and was leading by 50 yards going into the final lap.

Robin Lingle of Missouri and then Delaney started closing ground on the back stretch but Day had too big a lead, with the Brigham Young runner nipping Lingle at the tape to be clocked in 4:02.4.

Morgan Groth who had been expected to give Day trouble as the Oregon State star sought a third straight NCAA championship title, wilted under the terrific early pace to finish fifth behind Ed Dean of Notre Dame.

"I just ran the first half too fast," explained Day, who had broken the collegiate record with a time of 3:58.4 at Bakersfield a week ago.

"I would have liked to have run a 1:57 half instead of 1:53 but I was nervous and extremely tense. And of course, I had Groth in mind."

Godfrey Surprises

Day said he's still undecided about running in the national AAU meet in San Diego next weekend.

Almost certain to run there is the upset victor of the meet, Larry Godfrey of San Diego State, who won the 440-yard hurdles over Vance Peterson, Occidental, and Tony Lynch, Harvard, in 51.5.

Another reversal came in the 220 when Earl Horrier of Villanova, held on to win by inches over Ed Roberts of North Carolina College in 21.1. Roberts, who was thrown out of the 100 Friday for jumping the gun, had placed third in the Olympics at Tokyo for Trinidad.

It was sophomore Bill Foadick who helped Troy to its tie in the team championships. He won the pole vault with a mark of 15 feet 8 1/2 inches as favorite John Uelses of La Salle had to be content with fourth at 15-4.

Foadick, who went to high school at San Jose across the bay, won over Mike Graves of Occidental and Gerry Moro of Oregon on fewer misses at the winning height.

The Trojans had scored only one victory, in Friday's high hurdles, and picked up points in only two other events — the long jump and discus.
