## Lindgren 'Sorry' He Misses Record

BLOOMINGTON, Ind.—An apologetic Gerry Lindgren failed to break a record in the NCAA Track and Field Championships here Thursday and when the little Washington State star doesn't rewrite the distance record books, that is news.

Between spasms of coughing, he explained that he hadn't slept much during the night, but quickly added that his sore throat didn't bother him during the six-mile race which

he won by 50 yards over UCLA's New Zealander, Geoff Pyne, in 28 minutes, 7 seconds — eight seconds back of the meet record. John Lawson of Kansas was a more distant third.

"The cough didn't bother me in the race, but it kept me awake all night," said Gerry. "I've had a sore throat about a week but medication doesn't seem to help.

"I'm sorry I didn't break the record," he apologized. "I'll try to do better in the three-mile." As it was, the record-breaking for the day was confined to Randy Matson's 65 foot 6 1/4 inch qualifying effort in the shot put. He did it on his first throw.

Tommie Smith of San Jose State and Charlie Greene of Nebraska tled the long-standing record of 9.3 seconds in the 100, but Smith was deprived of a tie for the world record in the 220-yard dash when the wind on the backstretch aided him ever so
