ton event.

None was posted for Vance Peterson of Occidental, who won his heat of the intermediate hurdles. Peterson was accused of both dragging his trailing foot below the plane of the hurdle and running out of his lane.

The invoking of the rule of "dragging the foot below the plane of the hurdle" in the 120 barrier event is an extreme rarity.

Tom Deckard, former coach at Drake and referee of the meet, said two inspectors in the rear of the race and one in front cited Copeland of violating the rule over "more than one hurdle." The report was that the officials said it occurred on three flights.

Bush Livid

Bush was livid with rage over the action.

"With the lanes 48 inches wide and the hurdles 42 inches wide, it would be physically impossible for Ron to get his big foot in the five or six inch crack between the hurdles running on an inside lane. I've never heard of such a decision," he stormed.

Neither had many veteran observers of track and field meets. Copeland, by virtue of his fast qualifying time had drawn a middle lane.

A highly successful veteran coach from the Southwest who asked that his name be withheld had this to say:

"I've never heard of such a ruling. Copeland would have to be a damned contortionist to violate the rule. And the officials, would have to have better than 20-20 eyes to see the violation."

The sun had set and there was deepening twilight at the time of the race, which was run at 8 p.m. There are no lights in the stadium.

Coach Bush's appeal will be heard by the NCAA track jury, composed of fellow coaches Bob Karnes, Drake; Stan Heisman, Washington; and Bill Bowerman, Oregon.

Bowerman's team is one of the contenders for the title.

Copeland ran a great race, staving off the closing rush of Dale Fredericks of Arizona, who was credited with the win in 13.7.

Greene Nips Smith

It was a day in which the only formful performance was turned in by Charlie Greene of Nebraska, who stood off San Jose State's fantastic Tommie Smith to retain his 100 yard title in 9.3. This, again, tied the meet record.

Smith had previously finished third behind Rainer Stenius of Cal State (L.A.) and James Helton, Utah State, in the long jump, to give the Spartans 14 points in their campaign for the title.

BYU, with 22 points, led in the team championship race after two days.

Bob Richards, a sophomore sensation, turned in an upset victory in the steeplechase and Mike Bianco's third in the shot helped put BYU up there in the top spot.
