## UCLA Sprints Away With Track Title

BLOOMINGTON, Ind.—UCLA won two victories in the National Collegiate track and field championship here Saturday.

The Bruins scored 81 points to run away with the team title after coach Jim Bush's protest won the reinstatement of his high hurdle star, Ron Copeland, who had been disqualified Friday after finishing first.

A quartet of meet records fell during the three days of competition—two by Randy Matson of Texas A&M in the shot and discus, one by little Gerry Lindgren of Washington State in the three-mile, and UCLA's 39.9 clocking in the 440-yard relay. Another, by Charles Greene of Nebraska in the 100, was tied at 9.3.

Most of the top collegiate stars go from here to the National AAU championships at New York next weekend, seeking places on the United States team that meets Russia in Los Angeles July 23-24.

So torrid was the competition here that only two of

the 12 defending champions present were able to retain their titles.

A tragic note came in the sprint relay Saturday (which UCLA won) when San Jose State's great speedster, Tommie Smith, pulled up lame near the finish line and was scratched from the 220-yard dash, in which he had been clocked in 20 seconds flat.

"I'm really pleased over the victory," said coach Bush,
"but I'm happier about the reinstatement of Copeland in
the high hurdles."

"I didn't sleep much last night worrying about the disqualification," said the Bruin hurdler. "I just lay there in bed and looked at the ceiling most of the night."

In addition to wins in the high barriers and sprint relay, Tom Jones scored a triumph in the 220-yard dash as he was clocked in 20.9, and then the Bruin mile baton quartet closed out the day by beating California and
