FRESNO - Running almost alone, Tommie Smith blistered a final 220 yards in 19.6 seconds to anchor San Jose State to a 1:22.1 world record in the 880 yard relay here Saturday

night Forty minutes later the same foursome of Smith. Lee Evans, Ken Shackleford and Bob Talmadge came back to run the second fastest mile relay of all-time, 3:03.5, and estab-

lish an American record. The 880 relay was the 36th world record set or tied in the West Coast Relays, which were run for the 41st time Saturday under perfect weather conditions.

It was a typical Smith record performance. Tommie doesn't just set records, he obliterates them. The 1:22.1 lowered the 880 record by a full half-secand from the 1:22.6 made by Abilene Christian, anchored by the great Bobby Morrow, in 1958

Plenty of Help Smith had plenty of help,

particularly from an unheralded sophomore, Bob Talmadge, who attended Hoopa Valley High in the tiny hamlet of Willow Creek, Talmadge, a run-oithe-mill 220-440 man until Saturday, ran the second leg in 20.1 to put the Spartans far in front as he handed off the national AAU 440-yard champion Lee Evans, who breezed through a 21.0.

Ken Shackleford, run ning his first 220 out of the blocks, started things off with a 21.4 furlong.

In the mile, Evans was even swifter than Smith. running 44.6 to give Tommie another big lead over UCLA's Don Domansky. Smith ran 45.0 with Talmadge clocking 47.5 and Shackleford 46.4.

Only the Trinidad and Tobago national team, anchored by Wendell Mottley, ever ran faster than the Spartans' 3:03.5. They ran 3:02.8 last August.

Boston Sharp Refore the Spartan out-

burst, the meet had seen such world best performances of the year as a 27-2-1/4 long jump by Ralph Boston and a 50.1 intermediate hurdles by Ron Whitney.

Boston's record, coming on his second jump, unnerved young Bob Beamon, who beat Boston at

the Mt. San Antonio Relays. Beamon, 19-year-old National AAU indoor champion fouled on all three jumps. Although old-timer Jay

Silvester won the discus at a meet record 201-21/2, the happiest platter tosser was USC's Gary Carlsen, whose second-place effort of 200-1 gave him a Trojan school record. Gary, who became the 13th discus thrower in the world (and ninth in the U.S.) over 200 feet, broke Rink Babka's USC mark of 198-10 made

in 1958 Back in third place for one of the lowest finishes of his long career, which includes three Olympic gold medals, was Al Oerter. At that, Oerter surpassed his own yearold meet mark of 195.0.

George Puce, the Latvian-born Canadian national who set a college division record of 197-812 throwing for the U. of Nevada Friday night, decided not to compete with the big boys Saturday. Another best in the

world this year was posted by Tracy Smith, the former Arcadia High miler, with an 8:32.5 two mile. Tracy led all the way to hold off George Scott of New Mexico and Australia, who clocked 8:34.3

Coneland Wins Highs

Ron Copeland, after getting his hand spiked while running a brilliant 13.6 high hurdle heat, came back to nip Ervin Hall of Villanova in a 13.8 final. Copeland, off slowly never led until the final Copeland's chief rival,

USC's Earl McCullouch, was one of several Troians who suffered from aches and pains. Earl stopped in the middle of his hurdle heat, while intermediate hurdler Geoff Vanderstock, sprinter Lennox Miller and javelin thrower John FitzSimons did not compete.
