Vern Wolfe are concerned, maybe they should not have run the 220 in the UCLA-USC dual meet. Earl McCullouch Troy's

great hurdler-long jumper and Hal Busby, No. 1 Bruin sprinter, both suffered leg cramps in that race and the injuries knocked them out of the AAWU track and field championships Friday at Hayward Field

McCullouch tried two jumps and after hobbling down the runway could manage only a non-quali-fying 22-2. Busby pulled up lame in the 100.

Rematch Ruined The side effects are that it will ruin the anticipated sprint relay rematch between the schools. Cal's Bob Price was second, but two more Emerald and Lemon jersied runners were 3-4 as John Woodward and Phil Hansen helped Oregon jump into a big lead.
