McCullouch Ties World Hurdles Record: 13.2

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI) - Earl McCullouch, USC's NCAA champion, equaled the world 110-meter high hurdles record when he sped to a 13.2 clocking Sunday in the Pan-

American track and field trials. McCullouch, a Trojan football end prospect, matched the mark set by Martin Lauer of Germany in 1959 at Zurich, Switzerland and tied by Lee .Calhoun of the United States in 1960

at Bern. His victory was all the more impressive as he defeated Willie

Davenport of Southern University, the national AAU champion, by four vards. McCullouch was runnerup to Davenport in the AAU meet at Bakersfield last month.

McCullouch also finished third behind Davenport and Richmond Flowers of Tennessee in the recent U.S.-British Commonwealth games in Los Angeles.

It was the first world record ever equaled on the University of Minnesota's Kalite track.

There was an aiding wind of 3.9

miles per hour during the race, well inside the permissible limit of 4.473.

"I felt good," McCullouch said. "I had a wind-aided 13.3 once (USC-UCLA dual meet) and a 13.4 for my best previous races. I don't want to say what my potential is but I think

13.2 can be beaten." McCullouch, off to a good start, never was headed in the race. Davenport, on the outside of the sixman field, was closing at the finish, but there was still plenty of daylight between the two runners. Two of the three official watches caught him in 13.2, a third in 13.3.

The record tying hurdles race came just before a torrential rain, accompanied by a tornado warning. hit the track, chasing the crowd of 8,389 to cover.

The rain drenched runners in the 5.000 meters, the last running event on the card, in which Van Nelson, Minneapolis, and Lou Scott, Detroit, finished one-two, and forced suspen-

sion of the pole vault.

Before the vault could be resumed, the rain covered the running track with 2 to 3 inches of water and officials used towels to dry off the Tartan vaulting strip.

Once the vaulting resumed, Paul Wilson and Bob Seagren, both of USC. and Dick Railsback of UCLA cleared 17 feet and 1/4 of an inch. But all three failed in three tries at 17 feet 5 inches. World record holder Wilson and former record holder Seagren made the Pan-American team on the basis of fewest misses.

Pan - American records

were beaten in 7 of the 13 men's and women's events, including hurdles

and pole vault.

Four national champions also were defeated.

One defending Pan-American champion, Jim Grelle of Portland, Ore, who won the 1,500 meters in 1963 in record time, finished third behind Tom Von Ruden, Los Angeles, and Sam Bair, Athens,

Ohio. Each clocked in

3:49.7, slower than Grelle's

record.

Other performers who surpassed Pan-American records were Barbara Freidrich, Asbury Park, N.J., with 181-11 in the women's javelin; Ed Caruthers. Santa Ana. with
