"When Earl won the long jump with his last leap that sparked the whole team and gave us the momentum we needed," said Wolfe, whose Trojans made a runaway of the two-day event. "That and Lennox Miller's double victory over Willie Turner in the sprints sort of set the tone for the day."

As might be expected. the 100-vard dash was won by an evelash as Miller got the jump on Turner of Oregon State at the start, and staved off the flying sophomore's closing rush to win by no more than three inches in 9.4 seconds.

Start Bad

"I expected a better start from Turner," said the Jamaican miller. "I didn't start well, but that's normal for me."

It was a different story in the 220, where Miller got a big jump in the first half of the race, with teammate Fred Kuller in pursuit. Turner turned it on at the end to edge Kuller as Lennox hit the tape in 20.8.
