Wind Blows Away Marks by Carlos, Proctor in NCAA BY SHAV GLICK

KNOXVILLE—Capricious breezes blowing out of Tennessee's Smoky Mountains cost Jerry Proctor and John Carlos a pair of NCAA records Friday, but they didn't prevent the two sophomores from winning national collegiate championships. Proctor was running toward the east when he long jumped a lifetime

best 26-11 3/4 and Carlos was running toward the west when he equaled the world 100-yard record of 9.1, but both marks were wind-aided Two performances the twisting

winds could not erase were Lee Evans' 45.4 when he nipped USC sophomore Edesel Garrison (45.5) by a step in a 440 semifinal and an 8:44.4 steeplechase by Oregon State's surprising sophomore, Jim Barkley. Carlos won the 100 final in 9.2-

with no wind-after his windy semi-

final 9.1.

"I was disappointed in the time today, but not that I missed the record," said the garrulous Carlos, who has predicted all season he would run under 9 flat in the 100. "The main thing is trying to win the championship for the school. And unless I get sick tonight I'll win the 220. You can quote me on that; the 220 is my race.

"The 100 was just an added attraction. I really only run the 100 because some people told me a big man can't do it," said the 6-4 Carlos. Proctor, too, was unperturbed by the wind. He said: "I've been training hard for two weeks for this meet and it was good to win. I'll try for the AAU next and then I hope to be back in Los Angeles for the Russia meet."

Friday's portion of the 48th annual NCAA meet was a big day for sophomores and a bad one for defending champions.

Redlands, Carlos of San Jose State, shot putter Karl Salb of Kansas and Barkley won four of the six Friday finals. The others went to another little-known Oregon State competitor, hammer thrower Steve DeAutre-mont, and high hurdler Ery Hall of Villanova, who twice ran 13.3, a tenth off the world record time he posted in Thursday's trial.

Four 1968 champions met defeat, Lennox Miller of USC was second to Carlos in 9.2; UCLA shot putter Steve Marcus was fourth to Salb at 61-7; long jumper Pertti Pousi of Brigham Young was third to Proctor at 26-4 and steeplechaser Kerry Pearce of UTEP was sixth to Barkley.

Record Smashed

The first four finishers were under the old steeplechase record of 8:48.6 set by Pat Traynor in 1964 as they followed a hot pace set by San Jose's Derold Dent and then Pepperdine's Ron Pettigrew. The swift pace took its toll of Dent, who faded to seventh, while Pettigrew hung on for fifth in 8:49.7.

The 11-year-old 440 record of 45.7 set by Ohio State's Glenn Davis was no match for the fleet of quarter milers who streaked around Tom Black Stadium's bouncy Tartan track

Curtis Mills, the Southwest Conference champion from Texas A&M. equaled it in the first semifinal and then came the torrid duel between Evans, the Olympic champion, and Garrison, the 18year-old freshman.

Barely Wins

Evans barely shoved his chest ahead at the tape, with fast - closing Tommie Turner of Murray State third in 45.5, the same time given Garrison. UCLA's Len Van Hofwegen was fourth in 45.8.

The Bruins, who sur-prised by winning the Pacific-8 title this year, picked up 13 points Friday with a 3-4 finish in the shot by sophomore Mark

Ostoich (62-2) and Marcus. a fifth in the long jump by Johnny Johnson (25-1016) and a sixth in the 100 by Reggie Robinson. Although pleased with

the point scored by Robinson, coach Jim Bush was bitter over the circumstances surrounding his performance.

Sudden Call

Robinson was sitting in the stands sipping a cold drink, waiting to watch the 100 finals, when the public address announcer suddenly called for him to go to the starting line.

Photos of the 100 semifinal heat, which had been run nearly an hour earlier. showed Robinson fourth instead of Texas A&M's Rockie Woods, who was already at the starting

Robinson started trotting down the length of the straightaway, with 250-pound Ostoich at his heels carrying Robbie's starting blocks.

Bush asked the meet director to give Robinson a few minutes to warm up. but the Bruin coach was told to stay away, that there was a television schedule to make. The race started as soon as Robinson got his blocks

It Was Taped

"It was bad enough, even mentioning television at a time like that," said Bush, "but it wasn't even a live telecast, it was being taped for Saturday. 1 wasn't so worried about how Reggie would do in the 100, I was concerned that he might pull a muscle and knock us out of the 440 relay, too."

Bush still harbors hopes that if Kansas should falter in today's 13 events, the Bruins might slip through for the championship with Jon Vaughn, Wayne Collett, Denny Rogers, Van Hofwegen and two relay teams to score points.

Kansas, with 30 points to 20 for Oregon State, 17 for Villanova, 16 for San Jose and 14 each for Tennessee and Washington State, looks like a solid winner, however. The Jayhawks have Jim Ryun and a host of other potential point-

makers who should put them past the 50-point mark

Oregon State is the surprise of the meet to date. Coach Berny Wagner picked up two stunning winners in DeAutremont and Barkley and has another pair of likely winners today in high jumper Dick Fosbury and discus thrower Tim Vollmer. But 40 points won't be enough.

The defending cham-pions from USC are far back with only nine points on Miller's second in the 100 and Tom Colich's sixth in the shot. Herman Franklin, showing the strain of trying to qualify in both hurdle races (he was the only one to try it) finished last in the high-hurdle final in 13.8 and also last in his intermediate semifinal heat in 53.0.
