

# Trojans Outshine Bruins; Both Win

UCLA walloped California, 95-50, and USC smothered Stanford, 114-31, Saturday in a Pacific 8 double dual meet at the Coliseum.

That's hardly news. Neither meet figured close.

The real story is that USC, on the basis of comparative marks, now rates as a favorite over UCLA in their dual meet at the Coliseum, May 6.

Doping it strictly on Saturday's marks, the result is unreal. USC would win, 96-49.

That's ridiculous, of course, but the Bruins may have some problems, particularly in the pole vault where Francois Tracanelli failed to clear the opening height and where USC's Robert Pullard hit an all-time high of 17-0.

Pullard was one of seven Trojans to set personal records. Others included Andy Barnett, 256-10 in the javelin; New Zealander Kevin Todd, 51-8 in the triple jump; Jamaican Henry Jackson, 25-1 1/4 in the long jump, and Earl Richardson, 47.0 in the 440.

The Bruins also had their moments although coach Jim Bush said, "We were flat, and I don't know why. I figured our kids would be up for the meet."

James Butts triple jumped 53-5 3/4, despite falling back in the pit, and Bush said, "I'm sure he'll be over 55 this year."

Dwight Stones and Rick Fletcher both cleared 7-0 1/4 in the high jump, and John Smith continued to make progress on his comeback from hepatitis, winning the 440 in 47.1 and the 220 in 21.2.

But the day belonged to the Trojans.

The 440 relay team of Lance Babb, Leon Brown, Don Quarrie and Willie Deckard ran 39.4, best in the world this year, and Deckard came back to win the sprints in 9.5 and 21.0.

Freshman Randy Williams had four jumps over 25 feet in the long jump, winning at 25-2 1/4. Jerry Wilson, running into a 5.38 m.p.h. wind, won the high hurdles in 13.8, with Babb right behind in 13.9.

Edesel Garrison, coaching teammate Richardson most of the way, won the 440 in a comfortable 46.9.

Quarrie, after being thrown out of the 100 for two false starts, ran an eased-up 21.0 behind

Deckard in the 220 as third-placer Leon Brown also clocked 21.0. Nobody was all out.

Neither were Bruins Smith and Benny Brown in the 440. Brown cruised to a 47.1 behind Smith as they tried for a dead heat.

Bush didn't like it. "I don't go for that kind of stuff," he said. "I tell my kids I always want them to give 100 percent. That's the only way to play it."

Smith said, "I'm more confident of my speed now after winning the 220. Slowly but surely, I'm coming around." Asked about the USC meet, Smith said, "I hope I do well, but that's not the one that carries me across the water. If you win the Olympic gold medal, nobody's going to remember that you ran last in a dual meet." . . . Garrison said, "I have to respect John, because he's got the record, but on May 6, when we go to the line, we all become equal. It's any man's race." . . . Quarrie, explaining his false starts, said, "I've had some ankle problems and I didn't practice starts all week. I just barely missed on the second one." Had he ever been thrown out before? "Nope," he said, "that's the first—and the last." UCLA's Jean-Pierre Corval scratched from the 440 hurdles because of illness.

Pullard said, "I'm running a lot harder and planting the

. . . Tracanelli still is handicapped by back and leg injuries suffered last summer in France in a bad fall. "One of his legs is shorter than the other," said assistant coach Tom Tellez. "We've had to fit him with a special shoe." . . . Bruin sprinter Gordon Pappas pulled up while leading the 220. His condition is doubtful. . . . USC's Wilson pulled up in the 440 hurdles after hitting a hurdle with his knee, but he's expected to be OK. . . . In the 100, Deckard was aided by a 5 m.p.h. wind. UCLA's Warren Ed-

monson, who ran 9.6, was going into a 2.2 m.p.h. wind. . . . Next week UCLA hosts the Meet of Champions. In the pole vault, Sweden's Kjell Isaksson, the new world record holder at 18-1, will go against Cal State Long Beach's Steve Smith who went 17-9 1/2 Friday.
