## Trojans Fumble Away Chance in Mile Relay as Bruins Win

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Could Leon Brown have stayed even with Benny Brown and could Edesel Garrison have overtaken John Smith on the anchor leg, giving the meet to USC, 74-71? We'll never know.

The Trojans took themselves out of it with a bad pass on the second baton exchange and UCLA went on to win the mile relay and the meet, 76-69.

It was an anticlimactic ending to a stirring struggle, a back-and-forth battle between the nation's leading college track and field powers at the Coliseum Saturday before 17,400, largest crowd for a dual meet here in 25 years.

The Bruins were leading, 71-69, going into the mile relay. That put it all on the line. Whoever won the

mile relay won the meet.

On the first leg, UCLA's Ron Gaddis came in 5 feet ahead of Earl Richardson. On the second leg, USC's Willie Deckard got a couple feet back on Warren Edmonson and was just a yard behind as they went to pass off.

Deckard offered the baton to Leon Brown, but Leon couldn't find the handle. He made a couple of desperate grabs, both times coming up empty, and finally put on the brakes. When he got control, Benny
