

Williams Posts 27-9, Quarrie 9.1 but Bruins Lead

**Trojan Pair Record Windy,
World Bests in Pacific 8
Meet; UCLA Has 52 Points**

EUGENE, Ore.—There's nothing USC's Trojans can do to stop UCLA's drive to the team title except steal a headline or two.

They did that Friday, Randy Williams and Don Quarrie riding the friendly winds of Eugene to a couple of world bests as the Bruins took command of the Pacific 8 track and field championships with 52 points after six events.

On a clear, warm day at Hayward field, Williams soared a wind-aided 27-9 in the long jump to even his score with UCLA's James McAlister and Quarrie ran away from the crowd in the sprint preliminaries, clocking a wind-aided 9.1 in the 100 and a legal 20.2 in the 220.

Quarrie hopes to break the world record of 20 flat today when the meet concludes with the remaining 14 events.

Bruins Uncatchable

There's no catching the Bruins who looked more awesome than ever as Francois Tracacelli and Ron Mooers went 1-2 in the pole vault and Rory Kotinek got a surprise second in the javelin with a lifetime best of 248-2.

Dave Schiller increased his personal record to 62-2 $\frac{1}{4}$ in the shot put, good for second, and Roger Freberg took fourth with his first 60-footer ever, a throw of 60-6.

Washington State is second in the scoring with 37 points, followed by Oregon State 30, Oregon 23, USC 19, Washington 12, California 9 and Stanford 3.

Whatever hopes Oregon had faded in the first event of the day, the 3,000-meter steeplechase. Favored Todd Lathers and teammate Gary Williams of Oregon both stumbled on the first hurdle of the last lap, Lathers fading to third and Williams struggling home sixth after being passed by two men in the stretch.

Beavers' Hill Wins

The race was won by Oregon State's Leonard Hill in 8:43.0. Other winners were Oregon State's Jim Judd, 250-0 in the javelin; Oregon's Mac Wilkins, 63-7 in the shot, and Washington State's John Ngeno, 28:23.6 in the six mile.

The long jump was something else. McAlister, jumping in the first flight, led off with a 26-9 $\frac{1}{4}$ to take the lead from teammate Finn Bendixen, who had a 26-5 $\frac{1}{4}$, his best ever. Both were wind-aided.

Williams, in the second round, tied McAlister with a legal 26-9 $\frac{1}{4}$, then came back with his big one which was aided by an over-the-allowable wind of 7.6 m.p.h.

Only two men in history have jumped farther, Bob Beamon with his world record 29-2 $\frac{1}{2}$ in the 1968

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Olympic Games and Ralph Boston with a windy 27-10 in the 1964 Olympic tryouts at the Coliseum.

In the UCLA-USC dual meet two weeks ago, McAlister upset Williams with a jump of 27-0 1/2. Did that fire up Randy?

"I'd be lying if I said it didn't," said Williams. "I'm still a sore loser. I can't take a loss. I figured I could win after my first jump today because I did just about everything wrong and still went 26-2 1/4."

Williams passed his last three jumps, saving himself for the 440 relay today. He runs the leadoff leg.

In the 100, Quarrie's time equaled the world record but was disallowed by a wind of 5.14 m.p.h. In the 220, however, the wind was under the allowable.

"I think he could have had the world record today," said coach Vern Wolfe, "if he had really pushed it."

Quarrie agreed.

"If I get a good start tomorrow," he said, "I'm going to go all out. I think I have a chance."

Nobody doubts he'll win the race—nobody, that is, except UCLA's Benny Brown who won his heat in a wind-aided 20.6

"I'll give it my best," said Benny who is odds-on to win the 440 earlier in the day. "I was running about 80 per cent today."

Track Notes

USC's Jerry Wilson, who had been doubtful, won his high hurdles heat in a wind-aided 13.4 but pulled up slightly as he crossed the tape. "I just don't know," said Wolfe. "We'll just hope his leg holds up. If it does, he could run a good one. That's the fastest first five hurdles I've ever seen him run." . . . Kotinek, who didn't start throwing the javelin until last year, was leading the event until Judd passed him on his last throw . . . "I'm really happy for Rory," said coach Jim Bush, "and I'm especially pleased because everybody told me I should have entered him in the decathlon. I don't think he could have scored any more in the decathlon and he still has a chance to pick up some high jump points tomorrow." . . . Oregon's Steve Prefontaine, who has been bothered by a pinched sciatic nerve, is scheduled to go in the 3-mile today. Among his rivals will

be Ngeno, winner of the six mile Friday. "I'd like to give Pre a good race," said Ngeno, "but he'll be fresh and that's bound to help him quite a bit."
