BRUINS, TROJANS TRIP IN NCAA; TEAMS 'EVEN'

BATON ROUGE—USC's hopes of upsetting UCLA in the 52nd NCAA track and field championships appeared to crash Thursday night when defending high hurdles champion Jerry Wilson failed to qualify in his first round heat at rain-dampened Bernie Moore Stadium.

Before the night was over, however, the Trojans found themselves right back in the chase when UCLA's Francois Tracanelli failed to qualify in the pole vault.

On The Times dope sheet UCLA was picked with 59 points, followed by USC with 50. Wilson was picked fourth in the hurdles, Tracanelli second in the yault.

So, the projected totals now are UCLA 51, USC 46. You could even make it 48 for USC, moving Robert Pullard up in the vault. He was picked for fifth.

Pullard also had his troubles, however, requiring three vaults to clear 15-6 and two to make 16-0. Tracanelli passed until the bar reached 16-3, then missed all three times, although coming close in his second try.

"It makes me sick, losing our two vaulters," said UCLA coach Jim Bush who also watched Ron Mooers fail to qualify. "But we're still in pretty good shape teamwise with a lot of good athletes still coming.

"Tracanelli is so inconsistent that I only figured him for fourth. So we lost only four points. I figured USC would get six from Wilson so they lost more.

"Like I've always said, you've got

to be lucky in this meet."

Wilson, the Pacific 8 champion who has been troubled all year with
