

UCLA, USC Splash to Victory

25-10. I was ready for 26 or better. I've been doing better than that in workouts. I'd like to jump 28 feet this year."

Gilkes, a native of Guyana, was quoted earlier in the season as saying the reason he transferred from Fisk College was that it was too cold in Tennessee.

Last week the Trojans were frozen out in the Dallas Invitational when the temperature never got out of the 30's.

"After Saturday's meet, Gilkes said, 'I guess I brought the weather with me.'"

Track Notes

In the 440 relay, USC's Ken Randle had a three-yard lead when he went to pass off to anchorman Gilkes. They never made connections. "I put my hand down too low," said Gilkes. "And then when the baton did hit me, my hand was so numb I couldn't hold it." Gilkes thinks the Trojans will be under 39 seconds soon and says, "We should break the world record of 38.6." ... Stanford had a two-yard lead over UCLA in the 440 relay, but Brown wiped that out on the exchange, then pulled away for a seven-yard victory over Scott Wingo. ... UCLA meets Oregon at Eugene next week. USC will compete in the San Diego Relays.

USC and UCLA meet May 3 at Westwood.

California's James Robinson was content to let others set the pace in the 880, then he came on for an under-the-wraps 1:51.8 victory. He had a 46.6 anchor in the mile relay. ... In the mile, USC's Rayfield Beaton tried to pass Cal's Emerson Davis on the final turn, but he skidded when the two runners bumped, then faded badly in the stretch. ... Bush on Clim Jackson: "He was just striding. I told him not to push it because he's coming off a hamstring pull." ... Bush on the conditions: "It's no fun but I haven't been to an Olympics or a national yet where it didn't rain. The kids might as well learn how to handle those conditions."

They held a double dual meet at UCLA Saturday and the only upset was the fact that 2,000 people showed up to watch on a cold, wet, miserable afternoon.

In a relentless, occasionally heavy rain, UCLA trounced Stanford, 101-33, and USC defeated California, 85 1/2-50 1/2.

The Bruins thus made it 32 straight dual meet wins and USC made it 32 straight over California which last beat the Trojans in 1943.

Benny Brown and Clim Jackson of UCLA, eligible for the first time this year, were impressive. Brown anchored wins in both relays and won the 220 in 21.4—with his sweat pants on. Jackson, despite a sore leg, won the high hurdles in a wind-aided 13.8.

Rory Kotinek set a meet record of 7-0 1/2 in the high jump and Lynsey Guerrero beat Pacific 8 champion Matt Hogsett in the 440 hurdles.

"I think Rich Gunther's 182-0 in the discus was the most impressive mark of the day," coach Jim Bush said. "With a wet discus in a wet ring, that is a remarkable throw."

Best marks for the Trojans were 25-10 in the long jump by Randy Williams and 21.1 in the 220 by James Gilkes.

California got off to a fast start and appeared primed for an upset, especially after USC dropped the baton in the 440 relay. But, the Trojans rebounded handsomely by sweeping the 100, 220, high hurdles and long jump to blow the Bears out.

It is customary after these meets to compare the marks of the Trojans and Bruins, looking ahead to their dual meet, but Saturday was no day for comparisons.

"I'm just glad we didn't get anybody hurt," said USC coach Vern Wolfe.

The UCLA-Stanford pole vault was canceled after two vaulters slipped on the takeoff and took headers into the pit. The USC-California triple jump also was called off.

Why was the meet held?

"I was ready to postpone it to Sunday," said UCLA athletic director J. D. Morgan, "but when I called the weatherman, he said he couldn't guarantee any better weather Sunday, so we decided to go ahead."

Benny Brown and Randy Williams both were disappointed.

"I was ready to go 44.9 in the mile relay," said Brown who instead breezed to a 46.5. "I was really psyched for this meet. My speed is better than ever. I think I can go 9.3 or 9.4 in the 100. Next week at Oregon. I'm really going after it in the quarter. I'd like to run 44.9."

Williams said, "I'm tired of jumping
